SPECIAL JOINT COMMITTEE FOR A RENEWED CANADA

Indeed, it would be preferable to have one-to-one discussions between Quebec and Canada once Quebec has held its referendum. We would benefit from following the European Economic Community, Mr. Speaker, which, remember, is an economic organization of sovereign countries.

GOVERNMENT OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Mr. Greg Thompson (Carleton—Charlotte): Mr. Speaker, on Wednesday, Premier McKenna of New Brunswick announced the make—up of his new executive council. Responding to the need to reduce government as expressed by the people of New Brunswick, the premier reduced his cabinet from 24 members to 18, a 25 per cent reduction.

This, along with mergers and streamlining of government departments, will save the taxpayers of New Brunswick an estimated \$3 million to \$5 million a year. The number of women in ministerial positions has also risen to five, the highest in the history of the province. Mrs. Shirley Dyshart will become the first woman Speaker of the New Brunswick legislature.

I congratulate the premier and all members of his new government, particularly those from my federal riding: Mrs. Ann Breault, a new addition to the cabinet who becomes Minister of Income Assistance; Sheldon Lee who retains his position as transportation minister; and Bruce Smith who becomes our new Solicitor General.

I along with my colleagues in this House look forward to working with the Government of New Brunswick in making a better New Brunswick, indeed a better Canada.
