The said resolutions were reported and concurred in and the Committee of Ways and Means obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), seconded by Mr. Hamilton (Qu'Appelle), by leave of the House presented a Bill, No. C-50, An Act to amend the Customs Tariff, which was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill, No. C-44, An Act to amend the Excise Tax Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, and considered as amended.

By unanimous consent, the said Bill was read the third time and passed.

The Order being read for the second reading of Bill No. S-11, An Act to amend the Trust Companies Act;

Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), seconded by Mr. Green, moved,—That the said Bill be now read a second time.

After debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

The Bill, No. S-10, An Act to amend the Loan Companies Act, was read a second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

The House resolved itself again into Committee of Supply, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bills, without amendment:

Bill No. C-47, An Act to authorize the provision of moneys to meet certain capital expenditures of the Canadian National Railways System during the calendar year 1958, and to authorize the guarantee by Her Majesty of certain securities to be issued by the Canadian National Railway Company.

Bill No. C-24, An Act to amend the Indian Act.
