

saevus, a, um, adj.: *Fieros, savage. Cruel.* In a good sense: *Spirited, daring, bold, valiant.*

sagitta, ae, f. [root **sak**, "sharp"; cp. **saxum**, **saxare**] *An arrow.*

sāl, sālīs, m. (rarely n.) *The salt water, the sea, the briny ocean* [akin to **śāl**, **śāl-os**].

saltem, adv. *At least, at all events, any how.*

sāl-um, i, n. *The sea* [Gr. **σάλ-ος**].

sālū-s, tis, f. [for **salv-ts**, fr. **salv-ō**, "to be well or in good health"] *Safety, welfare, prosperity, deliverance.*

sanc-tus, ta, tum, adj. [**sanc-lo**, "to render sacred"; see **sacer**] Of persons: *Venerable, august.*

sanguis, inis, m.: *Blood. Family, stock, race.*

sā-tor, tōris, m. [**sēro**, "to beget"; through root **sa**] *A father.*

saxum, i, n.: *A huge rough stone or fragment of rock.*

scōlus, ōris, n. *A wicked dand; guilt, wickedness.*

scēna, ae, f. *The stage, or scene, of a theatre. A wide open space, like a stage-scene,*

sceptrum, i, n. *A royal staff, a sceptre. Kingdom, sovereignty, dominion, rule* [**σκήπτρον**, "a staff," as that on which one leans or supports one's self].

scindo, scidi, scissum, scindere, 3. v. a. With Personal pron. in reflexive force: *To divide, separate, part asunder* [root **scin**, "to cleave"; cp. **σχίζω**; **caedo**, **caelum** (= **caed-lum**, "a chisel"), **caementum**].

scintilla, ae, f. *A spark* [akin to **σπινθήρ**].

scio, scivi and **scī**, scitum, scire, 4. v. a.: *To know, perceive, have knowledge of.* With Inf.: *To know how to do.*

scōpulus, i, m. *A projecting point of rock; a rock, cliff, crag* [root **skap**, "to see"; cp. **σκέπτομαι**, **σκοπός**; **specio**, **spectare**].

scū-tum, ti, n. *A shield of oblong shape, covered with leather* [root **sku**, "to cover"; cp. **σκέυη**, **σκούτος**, **κεύθειν**; **cutis**, **obscurus**].

se, acc. and abl. of **sul**.

sēces-sus, sūs, m. [for **sēced-sus**; fr. **sēced-o**, "to retire, withdraw"] *A retreat, recess.*

sē-clūdo, clūsī, clusum, clūd-ēre, 3. v. a. [**sē**, "apart"; **clūdo** (= **claudio**), "to shut"] Of cares, etc.: *To shut out, exclude.*

sēc-o, ūi, tum, āre, I. v. a. *To cut* [root **sak** or **ska**, "to out"; cp. **καίειν**, **canalis**].

sēcūlum, i, n. With respect to persons living in a particular age: *A generation or age; the times.*

sēc-undus, unda, undum, adj. [for **sequ-undus**, fr. **sēquor**, "to follow"] *Favourable, prosperous, fortunate.* Of a chariot: *Speeding along, rapid, swift.*

sē-cūr-us, a, um, adj. [**sē** (= **sine**), "without"; **cūr-a**, "care"] *Without care, unconcerned, regardless.*

sēd, conj. [same word as **sed** = **sine**, "without"] *But, yet.*

sēd-ō, sēdi, sessum, sēdere, 2. v. n. *To sit* [akin to Gr. **ἕζομαι** (= **ἱδζομαι**), Sans. root **sad**, "to sit"].

sēd-es, is, f. [**sēd-ō**, "to sit"] *A dwelling-place, abode. A foundation.*

sēd-ile, illa, n, [id.] *A seat, bench, etc.*

sēdītio, ōnis, f. [acc. to some fr. **sed** (= **sine**), "apart"; 1, root of **ō**, "to go"; and so, "a going apart"; acc. to others fr. **sē**, "apart"; d-o, "to put"; and so, "a putting apart, a separating"] *Insurrection, sedition.*

sē-mī-ta, tae, f. [for **se-me-ta**; fr. **se**, "aside"; **mē-o**, "to go"] *A by-way; a path, footpath.*

sem-per, adv. *Ever, always, at all times* [root **sam**, from pronominal **sa**; "together with"; cp. **ἀμα**, **ὁμός**, **δμοίως**; **simul**, **semel**, **similis**, **simul**].

sēn-ātus, ātus, m. [**senex**, **sēn-is**, "old man"] *The Senate; i.e. the council, or assembly, of elders.*

sē-ni, nae, na, num. distrib. adj. plur. [for **sex-ni**; fr. **sex**, "six"] *Six.*

sentent-ia, lae, f. [for **sentient-ia**; fr. **sentiens**, **sentient-is**, "think-
