### THE KING RECEIVES MESSAGE FROM ALEXANDER, KING OF GREECE

The King and Queen of England are expected to receive a message from Alexander, King of Greece, on the occasion of the funeral of the late King George of Greece.

The message is expected to be transmitted to Windsor and to Marlborough House and then given to the public. This despatch is expected to have been sent at about 11 o'clock yesterday morning, and it is reported that the King and Queen received it at Marlborough House.

Earlier in the evening the press message had been communicated to the King and the Queen Mother as a result of the Greek administration.

### QUEEN MOTHER PROSTRATED

The greatest sympathy is felt for Queen Alexandra, King George of Greece was her favorite brother. She only recently suffered another, the illness, in the death of her brother, King Frederick of Denmark. The Princess Victoria broke the news to her, and because of that the report was able to hope that the report was not true. But it was soon confirmed by an official despatch. Queen Alexandra was prostrated on the morning of the Windsor coronation morning to give her what consolation they could.

### AT ATHENS ON WEDNESDAY

It is expected that the body of the murdered King George of Athens will be taken to Athens for a funeral. He went to Saloniki immediately after the assassination of the king, and remained there in the capacity of commander-in-chief of the army.

King George of Greece was a frequent visitor to London, his last visit being on the occasion of King Edward's funeral, when he met Col. Rhodes Ross, who was then in London, and who was friendly with the ex-president, who he impressed as one of the most democratic characters among the European sovereigns.

### MADE FRIENDS EASILY

During a former visit to the city, the London corporation entertained him at the Guildhall, and presented him with an address of welcome. Of the crowned heads of Europe, King George of Greece and his Danish brother, King Frederick, who was overthrown by a fatal illness while strolling in the streets of Copenhagen, were among the most unostentatious. He had many friends among the diplomats of the various nations and some of his warmest friendships were with untitled persons.

King George had a particular fondness for a good dinner and a game of golf, and was known to frequent the best restaurants in the continental capitals.

### EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY

The Earl of Selborne, presiding at a meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute, announced the death of the king and said that all would wish to express their deep sympathy for the Queen Mother Alexandra in her bitter bereavement.

The Greek legation had received no official word of the death of the king up to 10 o'clock tonight, but two members of the legation, who were dining in London and many other members of the legation, were called to express their sympathy to the lord mayor of London and a message to the Greek minister, saying:

### CENTENARY TODAY OF LIVINGSTONE

National Services Will Be Held Throughout the Christian World.

### MEETINGS IN TORONTO

Congregationalists Propose to Build Native Missionary Training School.

Today being the centenary of the birth of David Livingstone, national services will be held in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, and a vast missionary meeting at the Royal Albert Hall tonight.

Livingstone centenary meetings were held in a number of Toronto churches last night, and will be marked by missions throughout the city.

The Congregational churches of the city will unite in the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the birth of David Livingstone by holding a mass meeting at Bond Street Congregational Church at 8 o'clock this evening.

### THEIR ARMY, AND SINCE THEN THERE HAS BEEN CONSIDERABLE FRICTION, AND EVEN FIGHTING.

The Greeks, nevertheless, established an administration and the king hurriedly left Athens for Saloniki. He played host to King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, and afterwards the Crown Prince of Serbia, on their visits to the city. He realized that his presence there was not without peril, for he was surrounded by malcontents, Turks who had lost one of their most cherished cities, and Servians and Bulgarians who envied the Greeks their position of power.

Never Took Precautions.

The king during his reign, and particularly in the latter years, passed through many dangers, but always went about either alone or attended by one or two aides. When he was struck down arrangements were being completed for his jubilee, and it seemed that this celebration would occur in a period of national triumph.

### PERSONAL COURAGE WAS HIS MARKED CHARACTERISTIC.

On one occasion when an attempt was made to assault him while he was driving with Princess Marie, he rose to his full height in the carriage and shielding his daughter with his body, furiously shook his cane at two men who were firing at him at close range.

Being unwilling to reveal his identity to the king, who abruptly walked away. Without more ado the sentry fired. The bullet grazed the king's shoulder. The next day the sentry was summoned to the palace, complimented on his attention to duty and presented with the Order of the Redeemer.

### THROUGHOUT THE LAST FEW YEARS GREECE HAS PASSED THROUGH A PERIOD OF UNREST AND NATIONAL ANGER.

The Cretan question, which caused the king's statesman who straightened threatened to involve the country in a struggle with Turkey. Since then the king, however, had used a moderate policy, and in 1910, by summoning an unconstitutional national assembly, finally rid himself of the hampering influence of the military league.

Again, in accepting the advice and service of Premier Venizelos, he placed the country in his debt, for it was Venizelos who, as statesman, straightened out Greece's domestic affairs and brought her into the Balkan alliance.

### THE KING WAS ACTIVE IN FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

The king was his own envoy and traveled much, pleading the cause of Greece in every court.

"If Mr. Bryan really expresses the views of the cabinet and the president the relations between Great Britain and the United States may enter on a phase which would be received with extreme regret by a majority of the sensible moderate persons of both countries."

The Standard describes Secretary Bryan's speech as "a fine example of friendly and indignant nonsense which the inferior kind of demagogic talks when he wants to catch Irish votes."

The Standard regrets the speech, which it says, it is impossible to pass as a mere indiscretion, just as the Panama Canal Bill is coming before the house, and fears that the Irish electioneering machinery will be brought to bear in favor of discriminatory tolls. "And," adds the paper, "if this is to receive the support of the administration the prospects of a just and favorable settlement would seem doubtful."

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### HENRY LOVE WAS COMMITTED TO TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Many Witnesses Will Be Called by the Crown to Testify Against Man Who Is Accused of Killing His Wife—Boy Will Give Evidence Against His Father—Little New Light on Case.

### (By a Staff Reporter.)

OWEN SOUND, Ont., March 18.—Accused of murdering his wife, Hannah Lucilla Love, in their home at Ceylon, near Plesherton, on December 9 last, Henry Love will appear in the sessions here tomorrow. After court had been adjourned by Mr. Justice Lennox this afternoon, the grand jury decided that there was enough evidence to justify the trial of Love. His bill was sealed, and will be presented to his lordship in the morning.

Hundreds of curious people were unable to gain admission to the courtroom, which was packed to suffocation. Love, whose evidence resulted in the trial of his wife, was present, and seemed to take a great interest in the preparations being made for the hearing of the case.

Many Witnesses.

Crown Prosecutor H. D. Gamble of Toronto stated he would likely call about twenty witnesses. W. H. Wright, who is defending Love, declined to say definitely how many people would testify on behalf of the accused. Mr. Wright may only call one witness, and he may call a dozen. Ever since the body of Mrs. Love was discovered, almost three days after the woman had been murdered, detectives have been working in the case. The World learned last night that they had been able to discover just how the crime was committed.

New evidence shows that the murder occurred on Monday night, about nine o'clock. While working in the kitchen the woman was struck down by a club. The man who was seen to strike her was the murderer. Without setting his burden down, the man crawled into the slight excavation at the back of the cellar. Here he deposited Mrs. Love. After sticking a lance thru the throat in two distinct places the murderer

dragged the body back into the farthest corner of the excavation.

As the result of a minute scrutiny of the opening at the rear of the cellar, Provincial Detective Reburn has become convinced that the woman was really killed after being dragged under the house. The blue clay just inside the hole showed where a large quantity of mud had been dug out. This fact makes it almost certain that Mrs. Love was felled by a blow from a club and then carried into the cellar, where the arteries of the throat were severed with a knife.

A bucket, as might come off a pair of overalls, was found by the police. Also it has been brought out in the testimony, an attempt will be made to show that Henry Love wore a suit of "smocks" on the day of the murder, and that these shortly afterwards were burned. All along the police have contended that clothes were burned in a stove at the Love home on the Tuesday following the disappearance of Mrs. Love.
