In opening the debate Hon. Mr. Loughheed declared that Senator Choquette's objections were not well founded.

The security the government is getting is ample, he declared, and he did not believe it was reasonable that Mackenzie and Mann should be required to pledge their personal fortunes for the success of the completion and operation of a 10,000-mile system such as the C. N. R. The statement that the bill had built up colossal fortunes for themselves out of the construction of the road, was not borne out by evidence.

Parliament, said Choquette, Senator Choquette, Quebec, offered an amendment providing that the bill should be sent to the railway committee of the senate, and that the committee should have the power to summon witnesses and require evidence to be given. Senator Choquette said it appeared that Mackenzie and Mann combined never had he such a farce as was being enacted in the senate. He referred to the fact that Senator Loughheed had been a member of the committee who had lost money in the failure of the Farmers' Bank, being re-elected, and now when Mackenzie and Mann came along he was being asked to vote for a bill that would give them a fortune.

He considered it most dangerous for the government to enter into a partnership with the Canadian Northern, or what was virtually Mackenzie and Mann.

Senator Choquette's motion was voted down, 35 to 20.
