POLICE STOP BURIAL IN SUPPOSED POISON CASE

Body of Girl Who Diee at Institution Held To Permit

Inquest.

Despite the specific provision that an inquest must be held in every case of death in a public institution, the body of Evelyn Jean Crozier, a 17-year-old girl who died Thursday morning in the Alexandra Industrial School on the Kingston-road, in York County, was that day taken out of the jurisdiction of the county coroners without diction of the county coroners without an notification to any of them and held at the undertaking rooms of N. B. Cobbledick, Danforth-road and Main-street, from that time until yes terday afternoon, without any notifi-cation to the chief coroner of the City Toronto. Even then knowledge of acts came to the city officer thru a third party and not as an official no-tification. When the chief coroner learned of the events surrounding the death he ordered the detention of the body, and having reason to believe that such a course might be necessary in view of the intention to immediately ours. he sent a policeman to the Col bledick mortuary to enforce his order. Coroner George W. Graham of Avenue-road was appointed and will open o'clock. Then he will allow the body to be buried, adjourning the inquest to

"Y"-ing Cars at Humberside

In view of the comments that have been made regarding the turning of the Dundas cars at Humberside in the evening rush hours, a brief statement of the facts in the case are in order.

It should be understood that these cars have to operate over a single track from Woodville Avenue to Keele Street, a distance of about two hundred yards. Only three cars can use this strip of single track at the same time for the purpose of "Y"-ing, and it takes six or eight minutes for a car leaving the double tracks at Keele Street to complete the operation and return. Other cars that arrive at the end of the double track in this time have to wait until the cars in front of them have "Y"-ed and have reached the double track again.

If every car were sent over this single track strip, it would mean that every car would be thus delayed. The company attempts to solve the problem by turning some cars at Humberside Avenue, and sending them back, in order not to keep people waiting for down-town cars any longer than is necessary.

The official whose duty it is to "Y" the cars is instructed to use his best judgment in selecting cars, and not to turn cars that are filled. but to pick out those that have only a few passengers, and even then only when another car is ready for them to step into. Passengers who are thus requested to transfer should remember that by leaving the car they will reach their destination more quickly than if they remained in the first car.

More than this, they will enable the Toronto Railway Company to give a much better service to the intending passengers who are waiting for the cars to get down town, in whose interest the cars are turned.
