MARATHON RACE TO-DAY THE ENTRIES TOTAL 74

Mayor Coatsworth Will Start Runners From High Park Gate at 3 P.M.—51 in Boys' Event.

Everything is in readiness for Toronto's inaugural Marathon race, promoted by Controller J. J. Ward, to-day, over the Lake Shore-road. His worship Mayor Coatsworth will see the army of runners away from the High Park gate at 3 o'clock. They go 7 1/2 miles out to the ride ranges, and back finishing at the start, to make the 15 miles. It will likely take 1 1/2 hours to cover the distance.

The boys will also be sent away by the mayor when the Marathon runners are away on the road. This race is from the Humber to High Park gate. Everything is in readiness for the race. No programs will be issued, the numbers as given below being official.

Thomas Lonsdale, the Indian, paid his respects to The World last night. He is in the pink of condition and Trainer Davis believes that he will surely repeat his Hamilton performance.

Mail entries yesterday brought the total up to 74 entries for the Marathon and 51 for the boys' race.

No attendants will be allowed to interfere with runners until the Humber bridge is passed, nor on the way back from the bridge to the finish. No pace-making will be allowed, and any runner having outside pacing will be disqualified.

All Marathon runners will meet at the Olympic Club and Parkdale Canoe Club, Lake Shore-road, near High Park, about 2 o'clock p.m.

After the race the officials will meet at Mrs. Meyers' at 5:30, where dinner will be served and medals presented. Mayor Coatsworth and James L. Hughes alone will be the speakers.

College Athletic Union.
The first meeting of the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union since its formation a year ago was held yesterday morning in the gymnasium at the university.

Professor Shortt of Queens, Kingston, was in the chair, and the points discussed were chiefly in regard to the relation between the university authorities and the colleges in reference to athletics. A proposed alliance with the Canadian Athletic Union was considered and approved. Considerable discussion took place as to the academic standing of members who are to be permitted to take part in college athletics, and finally a court of referees was appointed to deal with all cases of dispute. This consists of Professors McLeod of McGill, Shortt of Kingston and Delury of Toronto. This will constitute the final court of appeal.
