

The Exhibition a-Day Enters Upon the Second Week of its Unparalleled Success

ALL ROADS ON SATURDAY LED TO THE FAIR GROUNDS

Fine Weather Brings Out Tremendous Crowd—Day Set Apart for Travelers and Pioneers, Who Were Much in Evidence—Sir Mortimer Clark Gives an Address.

The most delightful weather of Saturday, graciously aided and abetted the host of attractions gathered together by the farseeing Manager Orr, and the result was an attendance that conclusively proved how great has been the interest created in the fair this year. A careful estimate has it that there were well over 80,000 people in the grounds during the afternoon.

The lieutenant-governor was the guest of honor at the directors' luncheon on Saturday, when representatives of the artistic life of the country, of that genial modern knight on the road, the commercial traveler, and gentlemen whose life work is the scientific preservation and development of the products of the soil and of the waters, met together at the hospitable board.

The guests included F. W. Bell Smith, E. W. Kelly, J. O. Kelly, W. Manly, Frederic Chalmers, and others prominent in the world of Canadian art; L. A. Howard, president of the Commercial Travelers' Association; J. Fielding, treasurer; Jas. Sargent, J. Moran, Dominion Travelers' Association; E. D. Stewart, vice-president Hamilton Travelers' Association; C. W. Nash, superintendent national history building; W. B. Yarmouth, president of the department of fisheries; C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture; Prof. Dr. George C. Creelman, president Agricultural College.

Lieut. Governor's Remarks. His honor, on rising to speak, was received with warm applause. He paid tribute to the devotion to the work of building up the exhibition shown by the directors. Everybody came to see the fair, and its value was inestimable in keeping the national spirit alive. The people met together, looked into each other's faces, and saw that they were all of one kindred in the empire. Gentlemen from the United States had declared that they knew of no annual event of the kind to equal it.

His honor expressed pleasure at the great improvement in the display of paintings in the art gallery, which afforded the people an opportunity such as they would not otherwise have of seeing the work of the great masters abroad.

On the Travelers. He considered that the fisheries of Ontario were being shamefully neglected, and that the waters should be made to produce as much value, acre for acre, as the land.

The attendance thus far is computed to be between 45,000 and 50,000 greater than for last year's opening week, and with the same average daily attendance, the figures for 1907 should show an attendance well on towards the \$50,000 mark.
