Winning Solocanic Mountain.

Grand Forks, B.C., Aug. 12.—R. A. Brown is becoming more enthusiastic every day over the rapid progress made in tapping the crebody in Volcanic Mountain on the north fork of Kettle River, 11 miles from Grand Forks. The tunnel, starting at a point 1300 feet below the summit, is now in 540 feet and the two shifts are making three feet every twenty-four hours. Mr. Brown is greatly encouraged by the constantly improving condition of the formation encountered in the tunnel. The rock hitherto has been green like in appearance, and is easily removed. The seams are greatly braised throughout. Within the last two or three days a black line, carrying talc, has been encountered. The lime is very soft and is as easily worked as soap stone.
