It is stated that the men who are pushing the scheme along will spend the summer in sounding the various players, and, after the season closes in the fall, a meeting of delegates will be held in New York for the purpose of perfecting an organization. e players want increased pay, corresponding to the lengthened season of 154 games, compensation for the weeks spent in spring training, and the abo-lition of the compulsory farming system. The practice of forcing a man into a minor league club, or even into another major league club, at a reduced salary, is a particularly sore spot, and will be the principal point of assault. Even if the plan fails the players think they can lose little by ascertaining their strength, whether they show it or not.

Now, all those trees can be saved by bridge grafting, which is as easily done as rolling off a log, or falling off a wheel, but even either of these amusements requires practice in order to do it gracefully. Bridge grafting cannot be done until the sap moves and the bark will lift from the wood, but now is the time to secure the bridges. Parties who desire to save their trees should at once cut shoots of last year's growth, same as for ordinary grafting, only they must be long enough to more than reach over the injured part. Bury the twigs overhead in damp sawdust, damp sand, or black loam soil.
