London, May 5.—The Figaro's report of depositions made before the court of cassation show that Gen. WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY CRITI-

CISED. Wm. Henry Preece, chief electrical engineer of the British Government, last night read a paper before the Society of Arts upon etheric telegraphy. He referred to his statement made to the society in 1894 that the experimental stage in wireless telegraphy had then been passed. At that date it was quite easy to speak across the chan-nel between England and France. Referring to the experiments recently conducted by Prof. Marconi, he said

that both the board of trade and the postoffice department had informed the officers of the Marconi Company of readiness to make a test of the system between the Southsand Head lightship and Dover. In spite of these offers the Marconi

is possible to signal across the Straits of Dover. The result is that two years after the practicability of such signalling had been shown not one single independent circuit exists. The operation of the Marconi Company, added Mr. Preece, are concentrated more upon the operations of the Stock Exchange than upon the estab-

The French Government has intimated to the Spanish Cabinet that it would to see the exterior debt of Spain taxed or the rate of interest reduced. The foregoing communication is due to the repeated reports that Spain had in contemplation such a step, which caused much anxlety to Spain's foreign creditors, many of whom are Frenchmen.

The minister of education of Saxony, Dr. De Seydewitz, has made a stir in the feminine world by the issuance a decree whereby all girls and young women attending the public schools and colleges in Saxony must abandon the practice of wearing corsets and stays. The wearing of corsets by girls of tender age, and the habit of tight-lacing has become so prevalent, particularly in Dresden, that the state foresees in the corset a grave menace to the well-being of posterity. Although the girls and their mothers protest against the measure and even threaten to boycott the schools, the officials stand firm.

The cause of these conditions is the stoppage of the electric light by the burning of a cable. Thousands of businesses suffered enormous damage. At the Thalia Theater the first act was performed on a stage lighted from accumulators. The remainrepair of the cable is being carried on by torchlight.

A TORONTO DIVER MORTALLY

HURT. London, May 5 .- Thomas Hardy was mortally injured while making a long dive in Alexandria Palace yesterday. The net designed to catch him broke with his weight. Hardy was born in Toronto 25 years ago, and his mother and sister now live there. His father, an engineer on the C. P. R., died three weeks ago. Hardy had repeately given exhibitions of wire-walking in Toronto and other parts of Canada, and in July, 1896, crossed the Niagara gorge on a wire. Hardy was opposed to the uneventful closing of his act by descending by a ladder, but the diving method was objected to by his Canadian manager, J. S. Jackson, of Toronto. FAST IN THE ICE

Half the Yukon Fleet in Danger of Destruction When Freshets Come.

San Francisco, Cal., May 5.-Advices from the north confirm previous reports that nearly half of the Yukon fleet is fast in the ice, and will probably

be destroyed when the expected freshets come. The fleet is composed of some thinteen steamers, and there is little hope that any of them will escape destruction. All of these boats were engaged in general freighing and passenger business between St. Michael and Dawson City.

FRIGHTFULLY MANGLED. St. Catharines, Ont., May 5.-Daniel

C. Borstedt, of Denver, Col., was killed here vesterday afternoon by falling off a freight train and being cut in two. Both arms were broken, his face badly cut, his heart and liver entirely re-moved and the rest of his body mutilated. He was apparently about 27 years of age, and, from letters found on his clothes, of good family, but in search of work.

WAS SEVERE

San Tomas Only Captured After Strong Resistance.

The U. S. Troops Well Handled-Big 'apture of Rice-The Heat Is Intense.

Manila, May 5, 8:25 a.m.-In spite of the peaceful overtures of their commissioners, the Filipinos vigorously resisted the advance of Gen. MacArthur's division from Apalit toward San Francisco, fighting desperately at long range. After running from trench to trench, they were driven out by the American artillery. The movement commenced at half-past five in the morning, Gen. Hale's brigade, consisting of five Gatlings, under the com-mand of Major Young, of the Sixth Artillery, two battalions of the Fifty-First Iowa regiment, the First Nebraska regiment and the First South Dakota regiment, advanced along the road, a few miles west of the railway line. Gen. Wheaton, with Hotchkiss and Gatling guns under the command of Lieut. Naylor of the Utah Light Artillery, mounted on hand cars, pushed ahead, the Twentieth Kansas and First Montana regiments deploying to the right and left when feasible. The country to be traversed proved the

worst yet encountered.

MILES OF MARSHES and many unfordable streams delaying the advance materially. Both brigades met with resistance simultaneously on approaching the river near San Tomas, which is about eight. kilometres from Apalit. The center span of the railroad bridge had dropped into the river and the rebels had left only a small force to check Gen. Wheaton, their main body lining the strong trenches in front of Gen. Hale. Although the attacking force poured a very heavy artillery and musketry fire

across the river, the enemy STUBBORNLY RESISTED FOR

OVER AN HOUR, ultimately breaking when Major Young shelled their left flank, and then retreated along the river bank under

Gen. Wheaton in the meantime tried ineffectually to draw the fire of the Filipinos in the trenches east of the track. So soon as they discovered that the nature of the country would permit only a few skirmishes on each side of the embankment, the rebels regained their courage, and fought desperately for three-quarters of an hour in the face of the American volleys, and a rapid-fire fusitlade, until flanked by

the Montana regiment. Then A GENERAL SCRAMBLE EN-

SUED, many of the enemy boarding trains that were in readiness, and the others taking the road to San Fernando, after burning the villages of San To-

mas and Minalin. About noon General Wheaton crossed the broken bridge, cleared the stragglers out of the villages, and advanced toward San Fernando. General Hale effected a crossing simultaneously after a slight delay necessary to repair a

stone bridge.

THE LOSSES. Our loss up to that hour (noon) was two members of the Nebraska and one of the Montana, killed, and Capt. Albrecht, three members of the Kansas regiment, two of the Montana, four of the Nebraska and one of the South Dakota, wounded. The enemy's loss

was very slight. After a short rest the advance was continued, General Wheaton encountering the first series of entrenchments near San Fernando. The rebels now opened a hot fire. Col. Funston, of the Twentieth Kansas, was wounded; one lieutenant was killed and four were wounded, while leading four companies of the Kansas regiment to outflank the enemy. General Hale pushed along the road, flanking the trenches. More than hundred sick and wounded men from Lawton's brigade were brought to Man-

ila from Malolos by last night's train. The heat is unbearable. UNITED STATES TROOPS WELL

HANDLED. The American Army has been skillfully posted at points of great strategic advantage. The insurgents expected them to advance on Balinag by way of Quingua, and had furrowed the entire country beyond Quigua, with the strongest sort of entrenchments. Instead of taking this course, Gen. MacArthur swung towards San Tomas, the route to which was almost San unprotected. General Lawton brought his brigade in against Balsuam from the southeast, covering the line of retreat of rebels towards the mountains and depriving them of a refuge upon which they had counted.
