Accused Agrees to Remit Amount Over-Charged.

The charge of levying excessive costs in connection with the seizure of goods for taxes has been withdrawn against J. D. Wilson, tax collector, Adelaide Township, an adjustment having been made in connection with the dispute. The case was to have been heard by Squire Chittick on Thursday morning. The charge was laid under the Assessment Act on information furnished by Edward Schweitzer, whose goods had been seized and sold for taxes.

Wilson agreed to refund any charges in excess of the amounts allowed by law. He claimed in overcharging or selling a greater quantity of goods than was necessary to satisfy the tax claim that he had violated the act because of his unfamiliarity with it. This explanation was accepted by complainant's counsel, and the charge withdrawn.

Premier Orlando reviewed the Versailles conference, and pointed out that so far as Italy was concerned the continuation of the war was no longer a matter of choice, but necessity. Also, he said, this fact is understood by all patriotic Italians, who are now willing to wage war to the bitter end. "All she wants," Premier Orlando declared, "and no less, and she can wish for no more, than the security of her national boundaries by land and sea and also the fulfillment of her national unity. unity.
"It is materially seen how Italy's

"It is materially seen how Italy's citizens view the war question by the fact that the unfinished national loan already has brought in three and a half billion lire, and it will, within a fortnight, be double any previous loan—all this money despite our defeat last fall. Italians are determined to fight until victory."

ARTILLERY OF BOTH SIDES ACTIVE, SAYS FRENCH STATEMENT

Four German Planes Brought Down on Monday.

Paris, Feb. 12.—The war office announcement tonight reads:
"Both artilleries were active in Champagne, in the regions of the Monts on the right bank of the Meuse, and at several points in the Vosges. There was no infantry action.
"On February 11 four German airplanes were brought down by our pilots. In addition our avistors carried." was no infantry action.

"Belgian communication.—On the night of February 9-10, one of our patrols penetrated shelters for machine guns near Kippe. After a hand-to-hand struggle they put the occupants of the shelters aut of action and returned to our lines, bringing back a German machine gun. Along the whole front there was limited artillery activity this morning. It was quite marked during the afternoon near Ramscapelle and Merckem."


