INDIANS OF NORTH SUFFERED SEVERELY FROM "FLU" RAVAGES
Local W. C. T. U. Receives Urgent Appeal to Help Them.

An eloquent appeal for help for the Indians of Northern Ontario who have suffered appallingly in the influenza epidemic was made yesterday to the regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. through a letter received from Mrs. Belle Ash-provincial Indian department for the W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Ashcroft's message said: "The Indians of Northern Ontario, who have suffered appallingly in the influenza epidemic, are now suffering from the ravages of the 'flu'. The death rate from this disease is unusually high. In many cases fathers, mothers and children have died. The amount of suffering is beyond description. Three families in the Fort Arthur agency, including Lake Nipigon, were wiped out. Several Indian families were found dead in the forest. The Indian agent at a camp in the woods, found a whole family dead from influenza, father, mother and five children. They had died without medicine or assistance of any kind."

It was decided to pass the appeal to the adoption of an Indian child, which will involve providing for her until she is of age to go to a Government school. While the Government will pay for the child's education, it will be necessary for the local W. C. T. U. to provide clothing and gifts, etc., to add to the little one's happiness and comfort. This was considered most favorably. Mrs. J. Jones reported visiting convalescent branches in company with Mrs. C. B. Blake, provincial organizer. Parkhill, Ontario, and Mount Brydges has a newly-organized union of which the president, Mrs. G. W. Webb, was present and introduced to the meeting.

HUN SPY TRAILED TO HIS DEATH BY REFORMED CROOK WHO BECAME AN ALLIED INTELLIGENCE OFFICER

COMMITTEE REFUSES TO TELL HAMILTON TO VOTE FOR RADIAL

Finance Body Declines to Bother About Prohibition Either.

ESTIMATES ARE PASSED
Agreeable to City Getting Motor License Fees and All Court Fines.

The following estimates were approved by the Finance Committee at a meeting held Wednesday afternoon. Industrial department, \$2,500. Police department, \$12,000. Last year this body spent \$13,500.

Police department licenses estimated for this year are \$2,625. Receipts from this department last year were \$2,428. It is expected that \$12,000 will be collected in fines in the police court this year, as against \$14,265 for last year. The amount of the day school for this year is estimated at \$4,000, being \$135 less than was actually collected last year.

Statute labor taxes also are estimated lower than last year, the comparative figures being \$1,800 and \$1,925. For the expenses in connection with the work of No. 1 committee the following items are approved, as estimated: Band concert, \$200; compensation for injuries, \$1,000; insurance, \$2,700; labor expenses, \$2,000; court clerk's office, \$3,000; printing and advertising, \$9,000; salaries, \$3,000. This is about \$2,000 higher than the amount spent last year in salaries; war service, \$1,000; denture expenses, \$800; election expenses, \$2,250; incidentals, \$3,500.

It is estimated that the income from the Federal Square properties will be \$2,562, and the rent of the market buildings is expected to amount to \$5,447. Fees from the market scales and the comfort station will amount to \$1,250 and \$125, respectively.

Firemen's Pay.
The recommendation of Chief J. Aitken that the men on the fire department under the two platoon system be paid at the rate of \$3 for the first year, \$3.50 for the second year, \$4 for the fourth and subsequent years, was approved. His recommendation was that the drivers be paid the same rate as ordinary firemen of the same rank was also adopted. The drivers at present receive a year extra salary.

This scale will not affect the men who are already on the department. Chief Aitken suggested that a motor truck be purchased to take the place of the present ladder truck. On motion of Ald. G. B. Drake, it was decided to retain the horses for another year on account of the lack of sufficient funds. Four horses will be purchased and three noble steeds, who have won out their usefulness in the service of the department, will be sold to the garbage department.

A request for a hydrant to be placed on York at Eleanor street, was referred to the Aldermen. It was suggested that they be sold to the garbage department.

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INQUIRY COURT GOES INTO DISAPPEARANCE OF LIEUT. J. CRYSTAL

Whereabouts of Officer Is at Present Unknown.

To investigate the mysterious disappearance of Lieut. John Playfair Crystal, who was a former member of the 18th Battalion, C.E.F., a court of inquiry, with Capt. E. K. Shuttleworth, 1st Battalion, C.O.R., as president, and Lieut. W. T. Bartlett and Lieut. E. W. Porter of the same battalion as members, met at Wolsey Barracks yesterday afternoon.

Lieut. Crystal saw service in France, and was later returned to the 4th Reserve Battalion in England, and then to this country, where he was attached to the 1st Depot Battalion, W.O.R. Last October the officer left for England with a draft from the W.O.R., saw his family there, later returning to this continent by way of New York with several Canadian officers. He stayed in the metropolis at a hotel for a few days, but then disappeared. The British, Canadian and American governments through their various agencies are searching for him.

Mrs. Crystal has nothing that would prompt her husband to purposely hide himself away.

"Outstanding figure of a man, being

ENGINEER WILL ONCE AGAIN REPORT ON RIDOUT ST. TROUBLE

Special Committee of Council Looked Into Situation.

After considering the report of the special committee composed of E. R. Seabrook, W. A. Wilson and City Clerk S. Baker, in reference to the Ridout street breakwater, it has been decided by the members of No. 2 committee to lay the question over for a report from City Engineer H. A. Brazier.

The special committee reported that the city could purchase 60 feet of land, south from Ridout street bridge, on which to build a protection for the street and sidewalk against the action of Father Thames when he goes for his spring rampage. Mrs. L. Upchurch of 20 Ridout street south offered the committee 40 feet off the north side of her lot for \$300, and the remaining strip, consisting of about twelve feet, can be purchased for \$70.

Mrs. Upchurch wants the city to agree to expend the \$300 which she would receive in the event of the city purchasing part of her property on a breakwater at the foot of the street. The aldermen do not take kindly to this proposition. They are all of the opinion that the city is in no way liable for the protection of private property from the action of the river, and if they acceded to this request it must have a tendency to prejudice their case they think.
