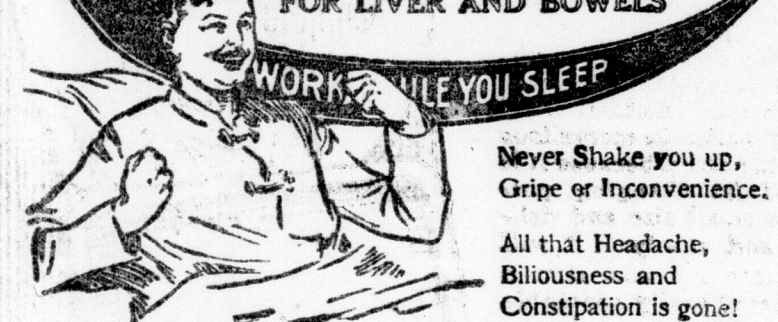

"MOUNTIE" TELLS OF 'CONVERSION' TO SOCIALISM

As Secret Service Agent He Became Colleague of Strike Leaders.

SOVIETS DISCUSSED

Speakers At Meetings Held Up Trotzky and Lenin as Great Men.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 5.—This afternoon's session of the trial of R. E. Russell, strike leader, opened with Mr. Lovatt on the witness stand. He continued his evidence by telling of the general strike.

In describing the meetings of the trades and labor council he reiterated his statement made at the morning session that the leaders of the radical element were the accused Russell, Johns, Armstrong and Queen.

Alderman Heaps, the witness said, attended several of the meetings. The witness told of the efforts of Senator Robertson to have the postal employees return to work and of the action taken by the strike committee to see that the return was not effected.

In telling of the telegraphers' strike the witness said that the only measure first approved by the strike committee was that they should go out through an arrangement controlled partly by Russell.

The evidence given later consisted of a detailed account of the early days of the strike, when the witness said, business men who employees were not on strike, but the confusion has resulted from the lethargic condition occurring in serious cases. The Dominion and Inter-provincial officers of health are fully alive to the situation, as also is the United States health service, so that everything may be done to minimize the spreading of the disease and give the best possible care and attention to individual cases as they occur.

FOUR NEW CASES. CALGARY, Alta., Dec. 5.—With four new cases of the so-called sleeping sickness and another death Thursday, the outbreak of the disease has reached epidemic proportions in Calgary.

Up to date, out of 45 cases of the disease, there have been four deaths.

THREE IN WINNIPEG. WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 5.—Three new cases of so-called "sleeping sickness" bring the total for Winnipeg to 45.

STRIKERS' CHANCES SLIM. WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 5.—Chances of ex-civil employees who walked out on strike last May being reinstated are slim, it was stated at the city hall today. Mayor Charles F. Gray has reaffirmed his statement that he would oppose reinstatement, stating that he may have to give the casting vote.

SCHOOLS FOR CONVERTS. As a Socialist, said the witness, he attended numerous meetings of the party—almost every night. These meetings were divided into two classes, meetings to discuss economics and meetings where "converts" were taught the art of speaking. The idea of teaching people to speak was so that they could go out and talk along Socialist lines, said the witness, and he gave a resume of what he meant by saying that such speakers spoke about the workers having nothing in common with the upper class; that they should organize so that they would not be exploited; and that their doctrine should be predicated for use of all and not for the profit of the few.

The discussions, he said, often turned to talk of a general strike, and revolution. Trotzky and Lenin were held up as the greatest men in the world, and the establishing of a Soviet form of government in Canada was also discussed.

The witness detailed the fullest proceedings of various conferences he had attended, and the speeches made for Socialism and he listed the speakers.

DISCUSS ABOLISHING POLICE COMMISSION; PROTEST INACTION

(Special to The Advertiser) KITCHENER, Dec. 5.—The special council meeting called to meet in the city hall this afternoon at 2 o'clock for the purpose of reviewing the incidents which occurred on Monday night resulted in an abrupt end.

The proceedings failed to materialize as there were not sufficient aldermen present to make a quorum. Mayor Grosse called the meeting to order at 3 o'clock after waiting an hour. He stated that while there was no quorum the meeting was to talk over the incidents of Monday night last, and he regretted that the aldermen had not responded to the call for the meeting.

The meeting promptly adjourned. There were about six war veterans on hand to watch the proceedings. As soon as the aldermen left the council chamber they went into a secret conference behind closed doors. From what can be learned they discussed the question of abolishing the police commission as a protest to the manner in which the police handled the mob on Monday night.

It was intimated following the conference by one of the aldermen that the police commission would be one of the principal issues before the new city council to be elected in January.

The same aldermen also stated that Ald. Bitter and Bowman, who were the quarry of the mob on Monday night, were unusually quiet at the secret conference this afternoon, having very little to say.

Judging from indications here the veterans are keeping a close watch on every move made by the council.

BILL IS PASSED TO GIVE INDIA PARTIAL SELF-GOVERNMENT

Two Members of British House Regret Measure Does Not Go Farther.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The House of Commons tonight passed the third reading of the India Bill, giving India a measure of self-government.

William Adamson (Labourite) and Sir Donald MacLean (Liberal), while complimenting the Government on what they declared was a long step forward, expressed regret that self-government in a larger measure had not been given India.

Edwin S. Montague (Liberal), the sponsor of the bill, said the proudest moment of his life had arrived. The passage of the bill, he declared, ended the old era and started a new one.

Does Not Fear An Epidemic of Sleep Sickness

Deputy Minister of Federal Health Department Makes a Report.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—Dr. J. A. Amyot, deputy minister of the department of health, who has just returned from Winnipeg, where he has been investigating the epidemic of so-called sleeping sickness, today issued the following statement in regard to the matter:

"The department of health, as a result of its own observation and information furnished by the provinces, reports in reference to the present cases of 'sleeping sickness' occurring in Canada that the disease at present is largely confined to the Province of Manitoba, having appeared there about six weeks ago. Since its appearance at that time only 40 cases have been reported in the province. It would therefore seem that no such sweeping epidemic as happened in the case of influenza is likely to occur."

"It is fortunate that at the present time the Province of Manitoba has as its medical officer of health Dr. Gordon Bell, a well-trained physician, a skilled bacteriologist and pathologist, and most careful and critical observer. He is carefully tabulating all results determined and taking every precaution that the best possible care and attention shall be given to each case."

"The disease is not a new one. It has been observed in Vienna several years ago, in England in 1919, when 200 cases were observed, and during the same time it had made its appearance in India, where it has been known as yet no specific remedy either for prevention or treatment of the disease, but under careful individual treatment recovery results in a large majority of cases affected."

"The disease of 'sleeping sickness' is a misnomer in that the disease is in no way related to the true African sleeping sickness, but the confusion has resulted from the lethargic condition occurring in serious cases. The Dominion and Inter-provincial officers of health are fully alive to the situation, as also is the United States health service, so that everything may be done to minimize the spreading of the disease and give the best possible care and attention to individual cases as they occur."

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Believes Alliance of Britain, France, U. S. Will Not Materialize

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 5.—Lord Robert Cecil, in a speech tonight, said he did not think the suggested alliance between the United States, France and Great Britain guaranteeing assistance for France in case of future aggression by Germany would materialize. Such alliances, Lord Robert declared, always broke down just when they were wanted.

TECH. EDUCATION DIRECTOR WILL VISIT PROVINCIAL EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENTS

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—Professor L. W. Gill, recently appointed director of technical education, has assumed his new duties. Professor Gill stated this evening that he proposed, as a preliminary, to make plans to visit all the provincial departments of education with a view to discussing technical education with those in charge of these departments. He expects to visit Toronto next week. It was too early, said Professor Gill, to make any announcement as to his course of action following these visits.

226 SHIPPING ACCIDENTS IN CANADIAN WATERS DURING THE YEAR 1918

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—The loss of 465 lives at sea during the year 1918 is reported in statistics bearing on shipping accidents in Canadian waters, compiled by Capt. L. A. Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner. Casualties to vessels numbered 226, and the damage done amounted to \$1,838,565 during the twelve months. Of the total number of accidents, 180 were to coasting and seagoing vessels, while 46 were to inland vessels. Sixty-seven Canadian, two British and eight

foreign vessels were lost in Canadian waters.

URGES DEPORTATION OF WIFE OF MURDERER

HAMILTON, Dec. 5.—When Mrs. Anna Kowalski, wife of the condemned murderer, who killed two of his guards at the jail last Saturday, appeared in court this morning, Crown Attorney Washington pressed for her deportation as an undesirable. She was charged with threatening Governor Ogilvie of the jail, because he refused to allow her to see her husband in the jail. She was remanded until the authorities can make arrangements for her deportation.

ABOLISH MARTIAL LAW. BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The Prussian Government has abolished martial law in Greater Berlin.
