DEATH OF MRS. R. BUTTER.

INCIDENTAL. March 21.—A week's illness, following a stroke of paralysis terminated today in the death of Mrs. Richard Butter, one of this town's most respected residents and a Derham pioneer. She had been a resident of Ingersoll for about 25 years and a resident of Oxford County for over 70 years. She was born at White's Station, Ontario, being a daughter of William and Frances Ailin, who came to Oxford County when she was only 10 years of age. On the 24th of May, 1855, she married Richard Butter, who for many years conducted a sawmill and cheese-box factory at Derham Centre. At that time Mrs. Butter was organist and took a very prominent part in the affairs of the Methodist Church. Her husband predeceased her five years ago. Mrs. Butter was honored by the Methodist Church here by being made a member of the quarterly board. Notwithstanding that she was in her 85th year, she was very active up to one week ago.

MORMONS HAVE ESTABLISHED A CENTRE IN CITY

Missionaries Have Held Meetings and Distributed Tracts For Six Weeks.

FEW CONVERTS AS YET

Prepared To Stay Several Years in London—Proud To Be Mormons.

Mormonism has invaded London. For six successive weeks Mormons have been distributing tracts throughout the city and holding Sunday evening meetings in the Knights of Pythias Hall on Richmond street. The largest attendance to date at a Sunday night meeting was only a congregation of nine. Last evening the attendance was six, four elders or missionaries, one local member and a reporter. An attempt was made to proselytize the latter, but was cordially welcomed and all the adherents of the Mormon faith offered tracts and information freely, but not too eagerly, and did not once betray the slightest fear that they might be misquoted.

WEEK-END CAMP TO BE CONDUCTED FOR BOY FACTORY HANDS

Official Plans New Departure For Young Workers.

OPEN FOR SIX WEEKS

Every Boy Employed in a Factory Will Be Invited To Attend.

So that the boys employed in the factories of the city may have an opportunity to enjoy at least one outing in the country during the heat of the summer, Robert Liddle, secretary of the industrial department of the Y. M. C. A., will conduct a week-end camp for their benefit somewhere in the vicinity of the city. According to Mr. Liddle, a start will be made in the early part of June, and each boy employed in a factory will be invited to spend a few days at the camp some time during the six weeks it is to be operated.

The Y. M. C. A. will provide all equipment, and will bear all the expenses except that for food. Each boy will be asked to pay only for the food he consumes. Several tents have already been secured, and it is expected that by the time the camp opens the accommodation will be provided for 30 boys. The camp will be extended if larger quarters become necessary.

Every facility used in the regular summer camps of the association, which will be operated separately, will be provided in this camp. A variety of sports will be indulged in, and woodcraft will be taught. If possible the camp will be located on a body of water, so that boating and fishing can be provided.

UNEDUCATED FOREIGNERS CAUSE OF MUCH TROUBLE

Brotherhood Speaker Urges Canadians To Take Action.

"Educate the foreigner," said Mr. M. Maxwell at the meeting of the Men's Brotherhood yesterday, at Askin Street Methodist Church. "The foreigner," said Mr. Maxwell, "has caused the trouble that is rampant in the United States." This, he stated, was due to a large number of the immigrants being uneducated. The men who entered the country.

The Brotherhood idea throughout Canada was to educate the foreigners as they came into the country through the Men's Brotherhood. This, said Mr. Maxwell, should be done, not only by holding prayer meetings and trying to reach them through the church, but by educational methods, which should be under the directorship of the brotherhoods.

If the brotherhoods throughout the Dominion would go into this and work in co-operation, a great deal of trouble due to the uneducated foreigner could be avoided.

The movement along this line, said Mr. Maxwell, should take in the whole of the country and should be not only an interesting thing to the men of the country, but a duty. It was they who made the country what it was, and theirs was the responsibility for keeping it what it was.

About 100 hundred members were present to hear Mr. Maxwell, who is secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Chatham.

The discussion will be followed up next week by Raymond Smith of this city.
