JOE WRIGHT KEEPS PENN OARSMEN ON STRICT DISCIPLINE

One of Crew Stayed Out All
Night At Dance and Lost His
Place in Boat.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Joe Wright, the husky Canadian governor of the Pennsylvania shell crews, recently out-fought by Yale, is a coach who decries the luxury and pampering which modern-day athletes receive in most universities. Joe intends that no such

conditions shall obtain at Penn—not on the crews at any rate. Wright laid the law down to his candidates at the start of the training season and told them the consequences of infractions. One promising athlete, Red Hinkle, violated Wright's training code by staying out most of the night at a dance recently, and found himself out of the varsity boat for the senior contest with Yale. Rumor now has it that other members of the Red and Blue Varsity have been guilty of lapses in training, and if they have Wright can expect no quarters from their businesslike Canadian coach. Wright's policy is one that will gain both the respect of the candidates and the best efforts of which they are capable. There is a lot of the small boy left in the youth in college, and coercion sometimes is quite necessary if any good is to be accomplished with him.

BRANTFORD, April 20.—Manager Knotty Lee of the Brantford Red Sox arrived here today and announced that eighteen players would report here next week for spring training. The infield and the catching departments are the only source of worry to the Brantford management. Thus far Infielders Murphy and Cully have not forwarded their contracts, and may not be with the club this year, while another catcher is required to help Moorefield out. The latter's contract arrived today. NEIGHBORS DECLARE WOMAN WHO KILLED STEPDAUGHTER, SANE

Jail Physician Also Finds No
Deficiency.

Quebec, April 20.—The legal and medical battle that is to be waged in the criminal court as to the sanity of Marie Anne Houde, wife of Telephone Gagnon, charged with slowly torturing to death her stepdaughter, Aurea Gagnon, was continued at today's hearing. The prosecution introduced neighbors of the Gagnons at St. Philomene De LeBlanc, and they testified that in their relations and intercourse with the accused, she never showed signs of mental deficiency, or insanity. She talked, reasoned, and acted as any other sane person and their testimony closed with the statement that "to their mind, the accused was perfectly sane."

Dr. Joseph Gosselin, medical officer of the Quebec jail, testified that he has had the accused under observation since she was an inmate of the jail and that she has always appeared rational. The court ordered his testimony taken. Dr. Gosselin stated that the prisoner was fully aware of what she was doing right along, and that she was not suffering from any moral or intellectual defects. He differed, therefore, with the other doctors on the board, who had contended the woman was deficient. It is expected that this

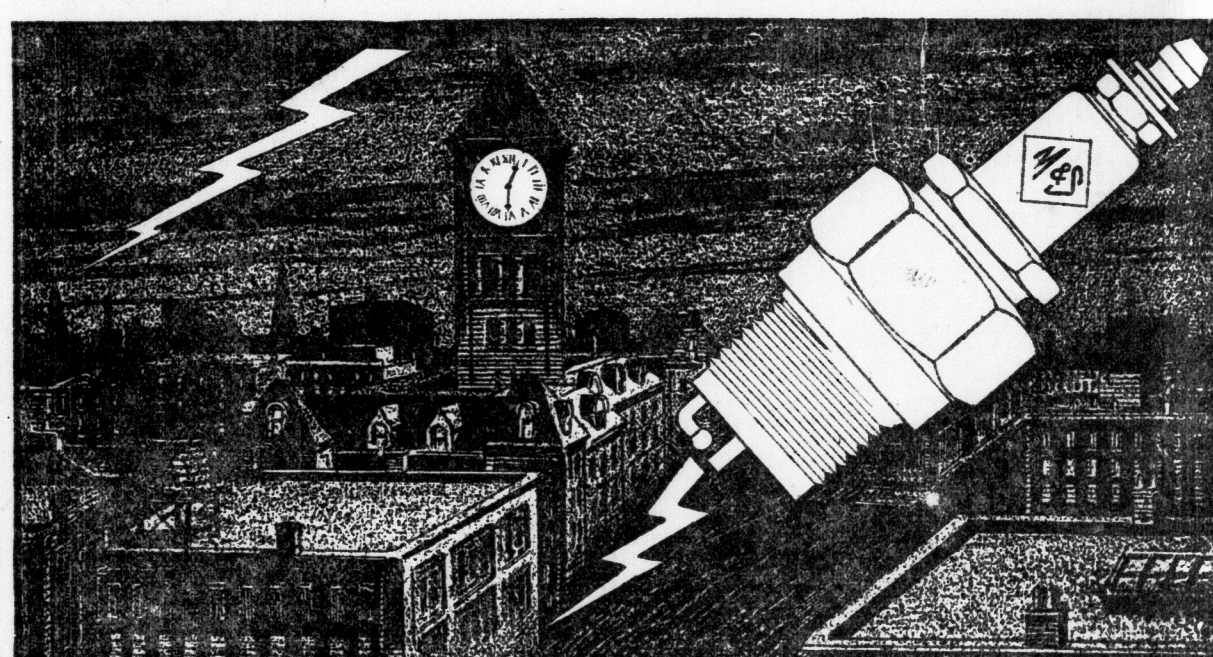
