JESUS GAVE WORLD RELIGION OF HEART

Christ Spirit Distinguished by Expression of Four Qualities, Declared.

"The coming of the Christ spirit into the heart of man is the consummate end of all endeavor, suffering and aspiration," said Rev. W. J. Knox of the First Presbyterian Church last evening. "All action should be regulated by the heart attitude. It was the Pharisees who first accentuated the importance of the external observance of ritual," he said. "Christianity is the antithesis of the religion of externals. Jesus gave to the world a religion of the heart. Although practice is greater than precept, if any man have not the spirit of Christ, he is not of Him."

Mr. Knox concluded by saying that the Christ spirit is distinguished by the expression of the four qualities—love, courage, sincerity and humility.

SINGING FEATURE AT SERVICES OF ARMY

Toronto Officials in Charge—Lacking of Power in Church Stated.

Special services of the local command of the Salvation Army were conducted yesterday morning, afternoon and evening in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium by Brig. Southall of Toronto. In the Citadel special services for the young people were conducted by Commissioner Richards, also of Toronto. At all services the singing was a feature.

"In looking at a picture painted by a wonderful artist," Brig. Southall said, "the people who do not understand art cannot pick out the fine points, and the same applies to people who do not understand the Bible. It is a pleasure for great artists to study the work of another artist, and it is a pleasure for those who understand the Bible to read it. We can train ourselves to become artists of the Bible and when we master this we will all experience wonderful happiness."

"If the force of the power of the Lord Jesus Christ could get into the churches today it would be better for the whole world. There is wisdom in everything, but in the church today there is lacking of power to get the force of the meaning of the Lord Jesus Christ and the Bible. Christ is like a dynamo. He has the power, and it is up to us to take advantage of that power and use it in our lives. He will give it to us, and we must all go after it regardless of creed or doctrine and unite as one," he declared.

MANY PARTICIPATE IN SPECIAL SERVICES

Musical Program at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Is Greatly Enjoyed.

Large congregations participated in the Christmas services at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church yesterday, when the minister, Rev. D. C. MacGregor, preached special sermons, and special music was rendered under the direction of C. E. Wheeler.

At the morning service Mr. MacGregor based his sermon on the words, "Good Tidings of Great Joy." At night his subject was "The Guiding Star," and in a powerful and interesting address he showed how the influence of that wonderful star, which directed the wise men of the East to the birthplace of the Saviour, is still active in the affairs of men.

He urged that the spirit that caused the wise men to seek out the meaning of the star, to follow its guidance, and then to bow in worship and praise before the infant child Jesus be allowed to control not alone the individual but all the concerns of human life and activities.

The musical program was greatly enjoyed from the opening organ numbers, "Choir de Lume" and "Pastorale" to the postlude, "Alla Marcia." The selections from "The Story of Christmas" by H. A. Matthews were especially enjoyed. The soloists were Miss Edith Kennedy, soprano; Miss Leta Laymon; alto; A. L. Christians, tenor, and E. A. Webster, bass.

TRYING TO SEPARATE VETS, LABOR CLAIMS

E. A. Pocock Expresses This Opinion of Employment Bureau Criticism.

London branch of the Independent Labor Party, meeting yesterday afternoon in the Labor Temple, passed a resolution of confidence in the direction of the Ontario employment bureau in London. The resolution was unanimous, and several speakers, including E. A. Pocock of the Ontario Public Service Commission expressed the opinion that recent criticisms of the employment bureau were deliberate attempts to drive a wedge between the returned soldiers and the local labor movement.

"The chief criticisms have emanated from cliques of men belonging to certain associations, but who instead of bringing up their alleged grievances through their own associations, go out and organize a new association," said Mr. Pocock.

Organizer McKinley of the steelworkers' union, with headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio, was present and gave an address on the importance of political as well as economic and industrial organization.

CHRISTMAS SPIRIT NEEDED IN WORLD

Principle To Be Applied Every Day in Year, Congregation Told.

"The Christmas spirit must become something more than mere sentiment. It must be a real principle to be applied every day in the year," Rev. R. G. Peever, D.D., declared at the First Methodist Church Sunday Morning. "It is of no value to say that we wish a joyful Christmas if we do not do something to bring that condition about. We must endeavor to apply to our daily lives the great lessons of the Christmas season."

"That is the great thing that is needed in the world today. The Christmas spirit is needed in Europe and in Ireland and in other places, where the great nations are grinding and crushing against each other like the icebergs in the Arctic."

"Amid that cold, unfavorable atmosphere we must still look to Jesus. Only through following his teachings can we bring about the peace and goodwill among men, which is the true spirit of Christmas."

Christmas is absolutely essential to the world, the speaker asserted. He portrayed what a calamity it would be if this season of inspiration and joy were to be entirely blotted out. Its outstanding importance was indicated by the fact that time was fixed by the first Christmas. It marked the two great periods of human history. No one could say why a new calendar had come into the world with the birth of Christmas, but it was a fact that men had reckoned all happenings as coming before or after that event.

"That its vital significance to the life of the people was realized was indicated by an occurrence in New York some years ago. Because a large part of the population is non-Christian a movement was started to do away with the Christmas teaching in the public schools, and with other Christmas festivities. The protest from all parts of the community was so vigorous that the attempt was futile."

SOCIALIST CLUB TOLD OF DANIEL DELEON

Anniversary Address Given on His Birthday—Predicted Change of Government.

DeLeon anniversary addresses were features of the program of the fortnightly meeting of the Socialist Propaganda Club in the Socialist Labor Hall, 112 Dundas street, Sunday afternoon. The occasion was the anniversary of the birthday of Daniel DeLeon, a leading worker in the Socialist Labor Party, who died several years ago. S. L. Bryce presided.

Fred Haselgrove told of meeting DeLeon in Detroit, and recalled one of his statements to the effect that "political government must pass away." This, said Mr. Haselgrove, was a prophetic utterance. Political government had failed, and DeLeon said, "must be replaced by industrial administration of things."

Things, continued Mr. Haselgrove, were real, essential and tangible, but in political government they were merely territorial representation. The men elected did not really represent any industry or organizations of capital in which they or their friends held the most stock. With DeLeon died 50,000 people lined the route of his funeral and wept in the streets, said the speaker, expressing regret that DeLeon had not lived until the close of the war to witness the evolution of a new social order.

Another speaker expressed the opinion that if DeLeon had lived a few years longer his advice and assistance would have enabled the Russian communists and social revolutionists to make a better success of the Russian experiment in socialistic government. It was decided by the Socialist-Labor men present to attend the labor election meeting in the Labor Temple tonight to study the local municipal situation. Arrangements were also decided upon for the distribution of socialist literature dealing with the question of unemployment.
