FUNERAL OF T. FRENCH AT SCARBORO TODAY

Was at One Time Very Successful Farmer Near Unionville.

The funeral of the late Thomas French, whose death occurred at the family residence, Jackman avenue, on Monday afternoon, after a long illness, removed a former well-known resident of the county. Mr. French who was 58 years of age, had lived in Markham Township near the Village of Unionville the greater part of his life, where he was known as a most successful farmer. A few years ago he removed to the city and was for some time in the employ of the Consumers' Gas Company.

He is survived by a widow, one daughter, Elizabeth, at home, and four sons, Bert, Robert and Howard in Toronto and Gordon in overseas service. In political life the late Mr. French was a Liberal. He was a member of the old St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The funeral will take place this afternoon at St. Andrew's Church, Scarborough.
