
TO 61 KING STREET EAST TORONTO THEATRES UNSIGHTLY.





MAY BE SPECIAL DRINK Consignment of Wet Goods From Chicago to North Country Arouses Suspicion.

The Ontario License Board is en gaged in the investigation of an in-teresting case which was recently re-ported. 
