THE EXEMPTION BOARDS OF ST. JOHN

Members of Tribunals Against Publication of Names of Those Appearing

Although the names of those applying for exemption and the grounds on which they are claiming exemption is being published in some of the upper Canadian papers, the information being given out by the exemption tribunals, the names of those applying in St. John and their reasons for being exempted, are not to be given out here, according to a decision arrived at this morning by the members of the local tribunals. The right to give out this information has been given to the tribunals and it seems that it rests with them whether or not they care to do so.

It was said this morning by Colonel E. T. Sturdee that the local tribunals were kept very busy during the day and in fact too busy to make up lists for the press. Moreover the members of the local tribunals decided that it was not a sure deal to publish the names of those liable under the act.

Tribunal No. 83, consisting of Dr. Manning and John Keefe heard twenty-five cases this morning. Ten were in category A, and so were sent away. Of the remaining fifteen applications for exemption, six were disallowed and nine were allowed.

IMMEDIATE ACTION URGED

Prevention of Tuberculosis Association Strongly Supports Matter of Medical Inspection in Schools

At the monthly meeting of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, yesterday, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—"That this association wishes to express its appreciation of the effort of the Children's Aid Society to secure medical inspection of schools. It cannot express too strongly the need of such inspection. Much of the tuberculosis that exists in the city is due to the health of the children being undermined by such conditions as bad teeth, poor vision, adenoids, and such conditions which could be discovered and remedied by proper school inspection; to say nothing of discovering many cases of tuberculosis. There are at present a large number of children of school age being treated at the dispensary. This association urges immediate action, especially as the compulsory examination of soldiers has shown startling discoveries."

POLICE COURT

The court sheet read "nil" today but there were several matters before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court.

Augustus Hawker was brought up with using abusive and insulting language towards William Sandhurst. Hawker explained that Sandhurst was a tender and that there had been a great deal of trouble down at one of the wharves with teamsters and Sandhurst, he said, had been particularly aggressive on the morning in question and had come into the office, refusing to go out. According to Hawker's story, he had then lost his temper and had used the abusive language towards the intruder which Sandhurst alleged. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$8.

The charge against William Ward of stealing an overcoat from Benjamin Dunlap was brought up again this morning and some further evidence was heard. Dunlap testified that he had left his overcoat, valued at \$15, in his room at 10 Charlotte street, where the defendant also boarded. On Wednesday morning he missed it and laid information against Ward, whom he suspected. Detective Dunlop found that the missing overcoat was locked up in Ward's trunk. On the other hand Ward contended that he did not steal the coat and knew nothing about it.

FIRE ON BLACK RIVER ROAD

A small wooden dwelling house on the Black River road, which was occupied by Mrs. Alice Kilpatrick, was burned to the ground early this morning. The fire is thought to have caught from the chimney, but its origin is not certain.

A little before three o'clock the fire broke out and in a short while the house was a mass of flames. The blaze produced quite a reflection, which could be seen in the city and many people were of the opinion that a large building or buildings were burning down.

The furnishings of the house were removed before the fire had made much headway. It is said that the house was insured. Recently the woodwork caught fire, but the blaze was extinguished before it had made any headway.

INSPECTION TOUR

Colonel J. H. Cameron of Toronto, Colonel J. D. Courtney of Ottawa, Colonel Robert Wilson of Montreal and Colonel Donald McGillivray of Toronto, advisors to the director-general of medical services of Canada, who arrived in the city last evening, inspected the armories this morning. They reported that they were pleased with the condition of things in St. John, but other than this they were reticent. They will leave this evening for Fredericton to inspect the quarters of "K" unit.

HOME FROM WAR

Miss Edith McCafferty of St. John, matron in the overseas nursing service, has arrived at Halifax on her way home on furlough after two years and a half of war work.

PREMIER IN MONCTON

Hon. W. E. Foster went to Moncton on the C. P. R. train today, called there to attend important meetings this afternoon and tonight.

Brazil's Blow at Germany

TRIBUTE TO DR. J. Z. CURRIE AT FUNERAL

Body of Distinguished Cambridge Physician Brought to Fredericton

Born at Keswick 70 Years Ago and Had Won Honored Place in His Profession and as a Man

The following from the Boston Transcript is of interest to New Brunswickers who were well acquainted with the late John Z. Currie, B. A., B. Sc., M. D., L. M., Ph. D., who was born in Keswick and was a frequent visitor to Fredericton:

"The funeral of Dr. John Z. Currie of Cambridge, who died suddenly of heart disease on Saturday afternoon in Arlington, was held today from his residence, 907 Massachusetts avenue, and was largely attended by Cambridge physicians and family friends. The services were conducted by Rev. Elmer W. Powell of the First Baptist church of Cambridge. This evening the body will be taken to Fredericton, N. B., where a church funeral will be held."

"Dr. Currie was the son of the late Thomas Gilbert and Patience Currie of New Brunswick. Both parents belonged to old Loyalist families. On the father's side the descent was from Earl John Currie, who came from Leeds, Yorkshire, England, and settled in what is now Peckskill, N. Y., in 1700. His mother was a daughter of Major Abram Yerxa, whose father, John Yerxa, came from Holland in 1710.

"Doctor Currie was born at Keswick, N. B., on Jan. 8, 1847, and was educated at the University of New Brunswick. He studied at several European colleges, and in 1874 he matriculated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Edinburgh, and at the completion of his course he was awarded the diploma in midwifery and diseases of women and children with the highest standing which had then been attained in the history of this college. In the College of Physicians in London he studied under Professor Patrick Heron Watson. He then returned to New Brunswick, where he held many positions of honor and was chief health officer of the province. He came to Cambridge in 1894, where he was known as an able surgeon and physician.

"He is survived by his wife, Helen M., and one son, J. B. Currie. He was a brother of A. Y. Currie of Trowbridge street and Dr. Willard Currie, a dentist of Cambridge, and Mrs. I. E. Smith of St. John, N. B. He was a member of several secret societies and of the Massachusetts Medical Society, the American Medical Association, and the Cambridge Medical Improvement Society."

The body, accompanied by Dr. Willard Currie, reached Fredericton yesterday afternoon and services were held in the Brunswick street Baptist church. There was a large gathering of former acquaintances to pay their last respects to the memory of the distinguished man. Rev. Mr. Warren, pastor of the church, who conducted the services, delivered an eloquent address on the life and attributes of the deceased. There were more than seventy handsome floral tributes, some accompanying the body from the United States, many from Fredericton and other parts of New Brunswick. The body was viewed by many former patients and friends in the Fredericton church early this morning. The sad journey to the grave was very simple.

Doctor Currie occupied a commanding position in his profession and in private life, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was a man of high principle and high purpose. While past seventy years of age he was athletic and vigorous, and death was wholly unexpected. Many New Brunswick friends regret his passing away and sympathize deeply with the bereaved relatives.
