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The Niagara celebration on the 16th July, 1892, was largely attended, His Honor Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick, Sir Oliver Mowat and other guests were received by Mayor Pafford and members of the local committee. On the arrival of the boat from Toronto a procession was formed and proceeded to old Fort George headed by the Army and Navy Veterans' band; there were also in the procession Niagara, Lundy's Lane, and the 19th Battalion bands. The town was gaily decorated for the occasion with arches, flags, and large streamers with suitable mottoes.

On arriving at Fort George the Proclamation summoning the first parliament was read by the Lieut.-Governor which was received by a royal salute of twenty-one guns by the Welland Field Battery. His Honor delivered a most interesting address, recalling the leading political events connected with the history of our country from 1757 to the present time.

Rev. Canon Bull officiated as chaplain by reading prayers from Captain John Brant's prayer book, printed in 1774.

At the conclusion of these interesting ceremonies the members of the committee and their guests partook of luncheon at the Queen's Royal Hotel. In the afternoon there was a large gathering in the town park, presided over by the Lieut.-Governor; Sir Oliver Mowat, Premier of Ontario, was called on as speaker of the day. He delivered an historical and patriotic address, which was listened to with intense interest. Eloquent addresses were also delivered by Senator Ferguson, Lieut.-Col. Denison, Dr. Oronhyatekha (a lineal descendant of Mohawk Chief Brant) and Hon. A. McKellar. The proceedings closed with the National Anthem.

The celebration of the 100th anniversary of the meeting of the first Parliament of Upper Canada took place in Toronto in front of the new Parliament buildings, Saturday, 17th September, 1892.

A procession was formed at the old Legislative hall, Front Street, and proceeded to the Queen's Park, headed by the Army and Navy Veterans' band. In the front carriage were His Honor Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Miss Kirkpatrick, Master Kirkpatrick and Commander Law; following in carriages were the members of the Local Legislature, City Council, High School, Public School and Separate School Boards, members of Pioneer and Historical Societies,
