TIPLING COP PRAISED,
GETS REINSTATEMENT Philadelphia Board Finds That He Drank Under Orders to Get Evidence

Philadelphia, July 18—A policeman was commended by the Civil Service Commission this week for being intoxicated while on duty. The citation was given James B. Lyons, whose alleged tipling brought about a raid on a West Philadelphia saloon, which had defed all efforts of the authorities to obtain evidence for a search without warrant.

Lyons was detailed by Lieutenant Reavy to buy a drink in the saloon. Later the patrolman appeared at the station house and made an affidavit

station house and made an affidavit on which a warrant was issued.

The Lieutenant, declaring that Lyons was intoxicated, suspended him. At his trial William H. Kreider, president of the Civil Service Commission, asked Lieutenant Reavy whether he had ever before been able to get evidence against the saloon, received a negative reply, Mr. Kreider said:

"This patrolman is to be commended. He was drunk, undoubtedly. But he got drunk in the performance of his duty. He was ordered to get the evidence on a suspicious resort and he obtained it. Case dismissed."

Atlantic City, July 18—Probably for the first time in the history of the courts of this state, the body of a murdered victim was brought into court this week at the trial of the aleged slayers. This unusual procedure was at Mays Landing, where Mrs. Pearl Willard and John Gilles, formerly a New York policeman, faced Supreme Court Justice Luther A. Campbell and a jury, accused of having killed Mrs. Willard's five-year-old daughter, Doris.

The embalmed body of the infant was produced for identification. Justice Campbell permitted F. Cameron Hinkle, assistant prosecutor, to exhibit it to the jury over the strenuous objections of Eugene Schwinghammer, counsel for the defense, after the prosecutor had explained that Mrs. Willard had denied the child was hers. That denial came, Mr. Hinkle said, after a regricker had found the body

That denial came, Mr. Hinkle said, after a ragpicker had found the body hidden in an old mattress, seven months ago, near the Willard home in

The exhibition of the dead child stirred the crowded courtroom deeply, and Mrs. Helen Von Popering, Doris' grandmother, sobbed. The two defendants concealed their emotion.

The only witness of the day was William Mullen, the rag picker who found the body. He identified it by a mark left on the neck by the sheet with which the child was strangled. In his opening address this afternoon, Mr. Hinkle made this direct charge.

"Mrs. Willard and her boarder killed this child because it, was not wanted this child because it was not wanted and had been an unwelcome addition to the Willard family ever since its birth."

The prosecutor then told of Mrs. Willard's denial that the body was that of her baby, and explained how identification had been made by the grandmother and by comparing clothing on the infant with some in the Willard home. He accused Mrs. Willard and


