

COUNCIL SETTLES METER QUESTION

Approves Bond Issue for the Purchase of Lot from General Electric Co.—A New Proposal re Employment Office.

The matter of the selection of meters for use in connection with the civic distribution system was settled yesterday when the Common Council unanimously approved of a bond issue for the purchase of the meters from the Canadian General Electric Company, limited, provided the city would receive the two-and-one-half per cent. trade discount.

Employment Bureau.

A communication was received from Premier Veniot proposing a new arrangement for the continuance here of the Employment Service Bureau. In the past, the contract for the bureau was entered into between the city and the Federal Government, each paying fifty per cent. of the upkeep, and the Provincial Government had agreed to pay fifty per cent. of the city's cost. Premier Veniot now proposes that the agreement be entered into between the Provincial Government and the Federal Government, and that the city pay its portion to the Provincial Government instead of to the Federal Government. Under the new arrangement, the Provincial Government would appoint the officials, while formerly they were appointed by the Federal Government. After discussion, it was finally decided to lay the matter over for further consideration, Commissioners Bullock, Thornton and Wigmore taking the view that the annual cost to the city should be limited in some way.

Premier Veniot also advised the Council that the resignation of Hon. R. J. Ritchie, as police magistrate for the city, had not been received yet by the Provincial Government.

A further communication from Hon. Mr. Veniot respecting the status of court action regarding the raising of the new C. P. R. bridge over the reversing falls was received. He said that he had no information as to when a decision would be made, in this matter and he did not believe that the Attorney General could tell when a decision would be reached. It was finally decided to communicate directly with the Attorney General on the matter. In the discussion on the matter, Commissioners Bullock and Wigmore suggested that steps be taken to put the unimproved section in Douglas avenue in good condition, pending a court decision in the matter.

A request from the McAlpine Directory Company that the city take a full page advertisement in the city directory, at a cost of \$36, was complied with unanimously.

School Trustees for the Council members to be present at the opening exercises of the new Albert School on the night of Thursday, June 28, was received.

A communication from the N. B. Tourist Association expressing the thanks of the association for the city's co-operation in the recent annual meeting was received and ordered placed on file.

A request from the United Automobile Tank Co., Ltd. to erect a gasoline tank in Prince Edward street was referred to Commissioner Thornton for report.

A request from the City of St. John for permission to erect an electric sign at their premises in Charlotte street was referred to Commissioner Frink for report.

Early Closing.

A petition from local retail shoe dealers, requesting the Council to enact a by-law to close all shoe dealers' stores in the city at 6 o'clock every evening except Saturday's and nights before holidays for the summer months was received and considered.

Mayor Fisher reported that all but one dealer had signed the petition.

Under the law, His Worship said that the Council was required to grant the petition if seventy-five per cent. of the dealers signed. It was decided to postpone further consideration until the Council meeting next Tuesday. In the meantime, the Mayor will check up regarding the number signing.

Coal tenders from the Maritime Rail Works Co., Ltd., for supplying the water and sewerage department, City Hall and the city market were accepted on recommendations from Commissioners Wigmore and Thornton.

Commissioner Thornton was given authority to proceed with the work of grounding all the city fire alarm boxes, at a cost not to exceed \$800 to be assessed for next year. He presented a report from Barry Wilson pointing out the necessity for this work. Mr. Thornton said that the boxes would be transferred to the poles of the civic distribution system and that when the transfers were being made, the work of grounding them would also be done.

Committee Report.

The committee report was adopted. It referred to the following matters: that three members of the Council would constitute a quorum for hearing tenders and other official papers; location of the monuments secured through the efforts of Dr. J. Clarence Webster; acceptance of the tender of the Canada Welding Works Ltd. for a steel stairway in the west side City Hall; approval of an application from the N. B. Telephone Co., Ltd., to construct and locate laterals; referring of applications from D. A. Porter and LaTour Hotel to erect electric signs to the Power Commission and Commissioner Frink respectively; granting of use of land at Silver Falls to William Kerr, E. J. Young and S. H. Coles.

PRINCE OF MONACO MAKES GIFT TO VACCINE INSTITUTE

Paris, (By Mail).—Among other gifts resulting from the laboratory drive in connection with the Pasteur centenary in Paris is that of the Prince of Monaco, who gave a liberal contribution to Dr. Lemoigne's vaccine institute. The great bacteriologist made some valuable discoveries in typhoid vaccines during and since the war, and the donation of the prince will make it possible to extend to the general public the benefits derived by French soldiers and sailors.

At a meeting of the Y. W. C. A. board of directors yesterday afternoon, the appointment of Miss Gwendolyn Richards of Campbellton, graduate of the Margaret Eaton School, as physical instructress for the coming year, was approved. The election of a president and of a general secretary was deferred. Plans were made for a summer camp for business girls. The report of the Travelers' Aid showed that 150 trains and 18 boats had been met, 128 persons cared for at the Transient Home, 144 assisted at the station and employment secured for three. The question of the possibility of securing another building for the residence and cafeteria was mentioned in the report of that department. In her report as general secretary, Mrs. Percival Foster spoke of the departure of Miss G. K. Peplar, the physical instructress, and the resignation of Mrs. Lugdin as president. She concluded the report with a short speech of farewell, stressing her appreciation of the co-operation given her.

Mrs. W. H. Lugdin, the retiring president, was in the chair and told of her regret that she must soon sever her connection with the St. John Y. W. C. A. work and of her appreciation of all that work for the St. John Y. W. C. A. had meant to her. There were many expressions of appreciation of Mrs. Lugdin's work for the association and regret at her coming departure.
