**WANTS LUSITANIA DELAY.**  
German Paper Voices Suspicion of Salvage Operation.

Berlin, July 21.—(Associated Press)—Commenting on a report that the American salvage steamer Blacky is engaged in raising the treasure chest of the Lusitania, the Tagliche Rundschau asks why this operation cannot wait until the ship is brought up shortly, and also why nitroglycerine is to be used in the operation when the Lusitania could otherwise soon be raised intact, except for the damage which she sustained when she was sunk.

The newspaper says that the quick sinking of the Lusitania, which made the rescue of the passengers impossible, was due to a number of explosions among the munitions aboard, rather than to the torpedo of a submarine, which at best would have caused only two compartments in the forepart of the ship to fill with water.
