Ray Caldwell, on Sept. 10, shut out his former team, the Yanks, without a hit, the first feat of this kind since 1908.

Roger Peckinpaugh scored five runs in five games, when the Red Sox stopped him, and Waite Hoyt stopped him after hitting in six games for .343.  
Eddie Collins was stopped by Walter Johnson, after hitting in nine games getting 15 hits in 36 times for .417.

**A Tournament By Telegraph.**  
To prevent a laxity of interest in sporting events amongst the industrial workers because of the cold winter season which is now almost upon us, an international industrial telegraphic bowling tournament has been suggested, which will no doubt create a great deal of enthusiasm in the industrial centers throughout the United States and Canada. A tournament similar to the one proposed will, because of the great expense of territory it covers, determine just which team is the real class of the ten pin game amongst the industrial workers.

Each five entered will bowl at its home alleys, the scores to be wired to headquarters immediately upon the completion of each game. This scheme of handling the tourney will attract teams from all over the United States and Canada, as it will obliterate the expenses that would be incurred in paying for the traveling of a team entered to any certain city which might have been chosen for the holding of a meet of this kind. One of the provisions in the rules makes it emphatic that bowlers entered must be employees of the concerns which they are to represent no less than two months prior to receipt of entry. This will prevent the sudden strengthening of teams which might occur in some cases for the purpose of winning a meet of this kind.

Over 800 concerns interested in athletics and recreation of all kinds for their employees have been invited to enter a team. Ottawa, Sept. 15.—Some members of parliament were notably disturbed this evening. A scorable cuchre game was going on in room sixteen while on the floors of the house a discussion was in progress on the peace treaty. It was noticed that less than twenty members were in their seats and as twenty is required for a quorum the party in room sixteen was disturbed sufficient of them brought inside to make up the quorum. The only one of the cabinet present was Hon. C. J. Doherty.

Mr. Rowell's statement on far gratuities to be printed for distribution through Canada at the request of the G. W. A. Owing to the absence of the minister of militia, Col. Currie's motion to adjourn to discuss the question of gratuities was out of order, and the debate on the address was continued.
