

ACTRESS BROKE RIB

Turned Ankle, During Walk in Park and Fell on Stony Path.

NEW YORK, April 3.—The peregrinations of the now famous Metropolitan Opera singer, who apparently has a long arm, is seen in the accident suffered by Frieda Hempel last week on the day before a Carnegie Hall recital, in which an arm which she used to sing at the Metropolitan was prominently featured.

The accident, which became known yesterday, occurred March 24, when the soprano, while taking a brisk walk in Central Park, turned her ankle on a stony path and fell. She thought nothing of it at the time, attended a dinner given for her that evening, and while feeling bruised and shaken in the morning, gave her recital Wednesday night as scheduled, with many encores. That one rib was injured was unknown to the singer, though the required long breaths had become painful. On Thursday morning a physician was called, the rib banded, and several days' rest ordered.

Mrs. Hempel, who has completely recovered, will start for the Pacific Coast on Monday.

No More English Signs In Japan

McLURG DEFENDED BY SYDNEY COUNCIL

Proposed Resolution, However, Withdrawn on Ground of City's Business.

SYDNEY, N. S., April 3.—The following resolution, presented by Alderman A. A. McLeod, seconded by Alderman H. M. Israel at last night's meeting of the Sydney City Council, was withdrawn, after practically every alderman had spoken in opposition, principally on the ground that the matter was "none of the city's business."

"The Mayor and City Council of Sydney recent as unwarranted and prejudicial to interests of the community, the persons of Mr. William Duff, M. P. for Lunenburg, on Vice-President and General Manager J. E. McLurg of the British Empire Steel Corporation.

"While taking no sides in unhappy differences between employers and employees this Council feels that Mr. McLurg enjoys in a large measure the confidence and respect of the citizens of this city.

"The difficulties under which he is carrying on are not of his making, but the department of years and personal attacks of this nature are unfair and only aggravate the situation."

ARRANGE TO BUILD STEAMER ON CLYDE

Direct Passenger and Freight Service, Montreal to Newfoundland.

QUEBEC, April 2.—There will be a direct steamship passenger and freight service this summer between the ports of Montreal, Quebec and Newfoundland. The company sponsoring the move in local shipping circles is the Clarke Steamship Company, Limited. The company recently completed arrangements to have a steamer built on the Clyde. This vessel is now under construction and will make her appearance in these waters during the coming summer.

One hundred first class passengers will find accommodation on this vessel, and eighty second class passengers. Here length will be three hundred feet.

TO RECEIVE TROPHY

Presentation at Imperial to McAdam Team, First Aid Winners.

The presentation of the provincial first aid championship trophy of the St. John Ambulance Association to the winning C. P. R. team of McAdam will take place at the Imperial Theatre this evening between the two shows. Col. C. A. Hodgetts, C. M. G., M. D., Ph. D., director-general of the association in Canada, will be present and, with Dr. James Magee, president of the New Brunswick branch of the association, will take part in the formal presentation of the trophy, a very handsome shield which last year was won by the St. John police team.

COAL STRIKE SEEN

U. S. Officials Fear Danger of Widespread Trouble Shortly.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Danger of widespread labor troubles in the soft coal fields which may profoundly affect the coal supply in both Canada and the United States is felt in responsible quarters here. While the strike in West Virginia is confined now to the northern part of the state, there are fears that it will reach the southern part, and there may be trouble in other bituminous fields.

Wage differences are causing the present trouble. Furthermore, the outlook for renewal of the wage agreement in the anthracite fields five months hence is unsatisfactory.

ARRIVE IN ENGLAND

Letters have been received from Dr. A. Pierce Crockett and Mrs. Crockett telling of their arrival at Liverpool, England, on March 21. Among those on the steamship was Lady Perkins, widow of Sir George Perkins, who was going to London to dispose of her property there before taking up her residence in Toronto with her daughter, Mrs. Grant.

DISSIDENTS LIKELY TO OBTAIN COLLEGE

Church Union Measure Would Give Knox School at Toronto.

TORONTO, April 2.—By the provisions of the Church Union Bill submitted to the private bills committee of the Ontario Legislature this morning by the sub-committee appointed to deal with Ontario provincial legislation regarding the union of Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists, a commission of three would be invested with coercive power to settle the division of Presbyterian church property in places of less than 50,000 population.

Another feature of the plan is that Knox College is handed over to the non-conformists, but provision is made for joint occupancy for a period of three years.

It was announced that Miss Margaret C. Phillips has entered on her duties as assistant matron for girls and Miss Vera Coles as assistant matron for boys. Arrangements were made for the annual meeting next month.

SIGHT HINDERS MUSIC

BOLIVAR, Mo., April 3.—Amos Cady could play six instruments simultaneously while he was blind, but now that he has regained his sight he can play only one. He was blind 20 years. The six instruments he formerly played were the harmonica, held in mouth by a yoke, the banjo, a bass drum, cymbals, a triangle and eight Swiss bells.

SMILE EXERCISES URGED BY JUDGE

Cure For Domestic Troubles is Suggested—Tell Man How to Look Younger.

NEW YORK, April 3.—"Smile Calisthenics" as a cure for domestic troubles has been advocated by Magistrate Kochendorfer in Flushing police court.

The judge had before him Edward Rapp, 22, charged by his wife, Mrs. Mary Rapp, with non-support. Before placing Rapp on probation until April 24 he said to him:

"The trouble with you seems to be that you don't appear to be able to smile. A smiling optimism is the greatest aid to peace in the home. There would be fewer men and women in the divorce court if they resorted oftener to smiling.

"The greatest beauty exercise is to stand before a mirror three times a day, at morning, noon and night, and go through smile calisthenics. After a few weeks of such exercise the person doing it will look five years younger."

Toronto Man Denies Smuggling Diamonds

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., April 3.—Indicted by a Federal grand jury, David I. Wilpert, Toronto, has been freed on \$15,000 bail in Niagara Falls, N. Y., on a charge of attempting to smuggle diamonds valued at \$80,000 into the States. Wilpert was caught some time ago by customs officials who found several hundred cut and uncut gems in his grip and concealed about his person. Wilpert pleaded not guilty and claimed that he is employed by a New York firm and was hurrying back and forth about the diamonds. Customs officials claim the diamonds came from Holland into Canada.

Supplies From Here For Cape Breton Needy

Clothing and supplies for the relief of the needy in the Cape Breton coal fields strike area are being forwarded by the New Brunswick Red Cross as a result of a request received by Miss Ethel Jarvis, secretary, from the Nova Scotia Red Cross. A case containing 58 articles of new clothing was sent forward yesterday. It was packed by Mrs. E. T. Sturdee. Another large case will go forward today.

BOGUS NOTE FLOOD THREATENS CANADA

"Money" Produced by Outfit Raided Near Montreal Not Circulated.

MONTREAL, April 2.—A flood of counterfeit Canadian bank notes now menaces Canada. Confiscation of a clumpy, amateur counterfeit plant and the arrest of seven men alleged to have been concerned with its operation by the Royal Mounted Police yesterday, does not in any way solve the issue. Beaudry Leman, general manager of La Banque Canadienne Nationale, and other bank officials declared today.

According to Mr. Leman the plant located by the Royal Mounted Police at L'Assomption had never seen the light of circulation. In the meantime the other plant which started distribution of Banque Canadienne Nationale bills some two weeks ago, it is said, is still operating. This is shown, it is stated by the deposits in the banks in several sections of the province, and these bills are sufficiently cleverly executed to escape detection, except by highly competent bank tellers.

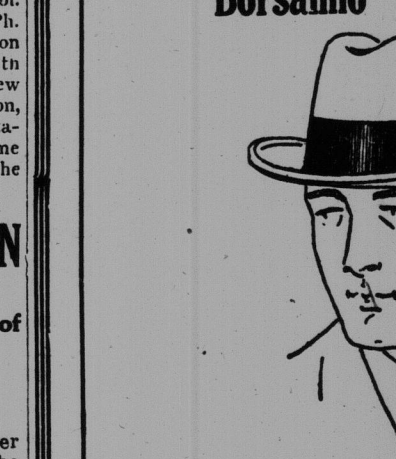

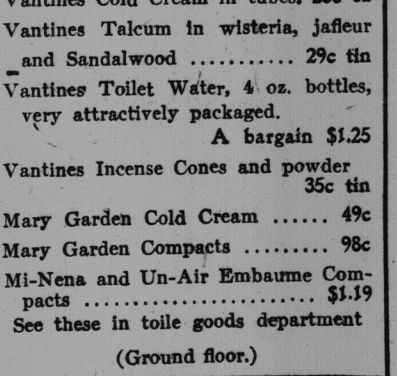

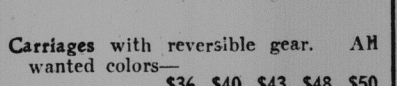
