The British Army.

The London Standard gives the strength of the British army as follows: In the United Kingdom 105,000 regular troops; 134,500 militia; 14,830 yeomanry; 174,240 efficient volunteers; 15,000 1st class and 21,000 2nd class army reserve; making a total on paper of about 454,000 men.

On the 1st January 1877, the effective strength of the regular army was 100,000. From this, however, 5000 men must be deducted for various departments, absent, sick &c., leaving 95,000 men. Recent recruiting has further reduced the strength by immature men, and the total force England can put in the field is stated not to exceed 75,000 men.

The first class reserve to be depended upon does not exceed 10,000; from the militia reserve about 25,000 half-drilled men could be obtained, but they could not be depended upon for the opening of a campaign.

An Archaic Schooner Wrecked in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

The schooner *Perseus*, of 68 tons, owned in Archaic, sailed on June 16th with a cargo of 75 tons of coal for Bathurst. On Tuesday 19th a furious gale came on, both anchors were let go, and shortly after the vessel went ashore on North West Reef, Point Misou. The crew were washed to the safest part of the wreck and made signals of distress and were in this perilous position 15 hours.

The Captain says: "The light-house keeper, Mr. Robert Rivers, tried to go to us in a small skiff, but was upon the surf. The Capt. made signals to try and get a larger boat and that there was no time to lose as we were getting exhausted. By this time Alex. Fougere, 14 years of age, a native of Archaic, gave up all hopes of being rescued, and became so much exhausted that he died shortly after, from exposure to wet and cold. At 5 p. m. a larger boat was on the beach and women caulked her with canvas. Mr. Rivers and one tried to get off to us, but the boat would not float. Miss Susan Ellis, school mistress, volunteered to come off in a skiff, but Mr. John Vibert took the skiff and came off and saved us. Took off the corpse of the young man and Ojua Moran to the shore, myself and Sebastian Sampson remaining. Succeeded in coming back again and took off Sampson, still remained alone. By this time the forecastle fell, making my position still worse to be rescued, as the part of the bow I was lashed to was breaking up fast. The boat managed to come back, and took me off very much exhausted. Could not have stood it much longer. Too much praise cannot be given to Mr. Vibert and the school mistress, and Mr. Vibert's son, of 12 years, who got in the boat to bail her showing great courage."

The Northern Light.

The Northern Light has recently completed her repairs on the slip at Pictou. The P. E. I. Patriot states she has been furnished with new pumps and bread-hooks. Heavy new beams have been placed over the boilers; a new stem of oak has been put in covered with iron plates three inches thick, lapping over each side ten inches. The iron plating of the bow fits neatly under these plates. A perfectly smooth surface is thus presented to the ice. Her stern is also plated with three quarter iron. A new iron rudder post, large enough to resist any pressure of ice, has been fitted in. A new rudder has been made with a seven inch shaft. A new wheel house has been applied. A number of repairs and improvements have been made in the interior arrangements of the ship, which will make her much more comfortable than she was last winter. Both the material and workmanship are excellent, and reflect great credit on the Superintendent.

The Papal Zouaves and the Union Jack.

Some excitement was recently caused in Ottawa and Montreal by the conduct of the Papal Zouaves on their excursion on Dominion Day. In returning from an excursion to Ottawa from Montreal, they substituted the Papal flag for the Union Jack, on the bow flagstaff of the steamer *Victoria*. On the captain hauling down the Papal ensign, he was severely assaulted by the Zouaves. There are several versions of the circumstances. A Canadian pilot, and B. Myrand one of the crew of the steamer were arrested. Consineau assumes the whole responsibility of taking down the flag and says the British Ensign was flying from the mainmast and the stern. Both sides have now had their say, and any bitter feeling that existed over the matter is subsiding.
