**FOREST FIRES IN NORTHERN COUNTIES ARE VERY SERIOUS.**

MONCTON, Aug. 27.—Forest fires are raging at many different points in northern New Brunswick, and unless rain comes soon a tremendous amount of damage will be done. The McSweeney mills at Catamount are threatened, and the owner went by a special train this afternoon to assist in fighting the fire.

Back of Berry's Mills region, about ten miles north of Moncton, a large district has already been burned over, and the fires are sweeping everything before them. Big fires are also raging on the Northwest Miramichi and tributaries, doing immense damage in the virgin forest, and wiping out camps, boats, houses and lumbermen's supplies. In the Coverdale poisoning case, the third child of Abner Reid died last night, and the contents of the stomach have been taken by doctors to determine if poison was the cause of the mysterious deaths.

The Amherst cricketers got a bad beating in Moncton on Saturday, scoring only 61 in two innings against Moncton's 231. Ackman of Moncton topped the score with about 50 runs in the two innings.

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 26.—Forest fires are raging around here. For many days this place has been almost surrounded. The loss to some of the farmers will be very great. There is no sign of rain, and the wind being high, the fires have got beyond control of Rosedale and other places. An immense quantity of hard wood, railings and bark are being destroyed.

**MANY RIFLEMEN ARE AT OTTAWA.**

West is Well Represented, Eight Men Coming from the Yukon.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27.—Their Excellencies Governor General and Countess Grey, with their family and suite, boarded their private cars Victoria and Gloucester at the Central Station tonight, and leave on the Imperial Limited at 1 a. m. for Edmonton. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Patterson travel on the same train in private car 109, the property of the dominion.

Riflemen from all parts of Canada are here preparatory to the D. R. matches, which commence tomorrow. While the maritime provinces representation is considerably reduced, it is noteworthy that riflemen from the far west are largely increased in number. British Columbia has 18 men here and the Yukon 8, and they don't leave on passes either. This is the first time the Yukon has been represented.

The blue-jackets and marines of the second cruiser squadron left for Toronto tonight. They were given a splendid send-off.
