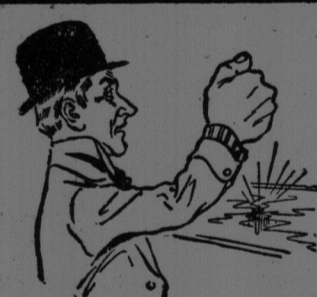

The new signal pole and yard arm have been placed in position and this morning Signal Master Morton put up the first signal which was seen by the public that a steamer had passed Ender Island. The steamer is the Montezuma which passed inward at noon.

A. O. Skinner, Mayor Bullock and a representative of the Board of Trade leave this afternoon for Ottawa to again urge on the government the claims of St. John to receive the \$50,000 grant for the Dominion exhibition of 1910. They expect to meet the government on Thursday.

OF DESERTED WIFE**

Strangers in the City; Were to Go to Halifax But Husband Did Not Turn Up at the Train.

A woman carrying a baby a few months old attracted considerable attention around the depot this morning by her sad plight. She is a stranger in the city and yesterday intended to leave for Halifax with her husband. He did not turn up at the train however and she has not seen him since and it naturally much worried about his whereabouts.

The husband's name is John McDonald and the family is English. They came out about five years ago and have been living in Philadelphia since. They reached St. John last week on the Calvin Austin and had planned to leave for Halifax yesterday where they intended to reside. McDonald had been drinking but his wife thought he was able to care for himself and went to the station at the proper time. When he did not turn up she was naturally much worried and has been watching every train since in the hope of meeting him.

### SOCIAL ENGAGEMENTS

#### INJURING THE CHURCH

Rev. R. A. Armstrong Discusses Those Things Which Tend to Lessen Christian Enthusiasm.

Rev. R. A. Armstrong is delivering a series of sermons on the letters to the seven churches. On Sunday evening last he spoke to a large congregation in Trinity on the letter to the church at Ephesus, which church had undergone a change, having turned from a loyal and zealous church to an attitude of coolness. The text was Revelations, 2:1: "Thou hast left thy first love." He pointed out that this applied Christians of the present day, and that there were three things which drew the modern Christian away from his first enthusiasm. The first was failure to extend his faith to others and bring others to Christ and the church; the second his failure to continue his devotional habits by which habits, whatever they might be, he had a contract with God, and the third was the spirit of the world. In discussing these, Mr. Armstrong said that in this day when social engagements were multiplied and the halls of amusement were a temptation to the young, the danger was that the love of pleasure might come between the Christian and his Saviour; the danger of this age was in being carried away by love of the world.

Tomorrow, Ash Wednesday, services will be held in Trinity church at 11 o'clock, and in the afternoon at 4 o'clock a children's service will take place. The children's services will be continued on Wednesday afternoon through Lent. On Wednesday evenings during Lent, a course of sermons will be delivered by the curate. There will be daily service at 8 o'clock.

### NO WEDDING BELLS

#### FOR DIMPLED DOTTIE

Miss Belyea, on Her Way to Her Lover's Home, Falls in With the Cops.

In the police court this morning one drunk was fined four dollars. Adeline Cardoso, a young woman most disreputable, yet somewhat attractive, was charged with wandering about Prince street last night, without giving a satisfactory account of herself. ### A. KELLY EVANS SPEAKS

#### OF LOCAL CONDITIONS

Well Known Expert Says New Brunswick Faces Serious Problems.

A. Kelly Evans, of Toronto, passed through the city today on his way to Halifax where he will address the Canadian Club on the subject of the preservation of the natural resources of the country such as lumber, fish, game, etc.

Speaking to the Star this morning, Mr. Evans said that the country is just beginning to awaken to the value of the natural resources. It has been difficult to arouse the public to the need for action to prevent the destruction of these valuable sources of wealth, but much has been done in the last few years.

A marked advance has been shown in Ontario in the last couple of years in the efforts taken to prevent the depletion of the natural resources. Mr. Evans said that the people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia had serious problems to face with regard to the fisheries, the value of which is being rapidly lessened.

To cope successfully with the various problems it will be necessary to have an aroused public opinion, and Mr. Evans commended the work which the New Brunswick Association is doing along the line.

### ANOTHER DELEGATION

#### OFF TO OTTAWA

Another civic delegation leaves tonight for Ottawa to endeavor to secure the \$50,000 Dominion exhibition grant for St. John. The delegates will be Mayor Bullock, A. O. Skinner and B. Allan. Mr. F. Burditt will probably also join them at Ottawa. The prospects of getting the grant are supposed to be bright and it will not be long before the money will be in the pocket.

Peter S. Miller, head of the U. S. immigration service in this city, was married on Feb. 17th to Miss Minnie Bell, of 300 Princess street. The ceremony was performed in the private parlors of the Hotel Touraine, Boston, by Rev. Whitrow. Only intimate friends of the bride and groom were present.
