PEARY'S POLAR DASH.

BOSTON, Feb. 28.—Commander R. E. Peary discussed the field work of his last expedition to the Arctic re-sions last alght in the Fogg Museum, before the Harvard Travellers' Club, the concluded with the statement that eaching the north pole was a relative-ble to three questions: Can it be done? What will it cost? Is it worth while As for the first, he thought the dif-mutities of the way had been so far smoothed that the pole will probably be reached in a rather short while that it is entirely practicable. His lecture, while bear-ing on the other phases of the proposition, was also a good deal of an an-swer to the third question.

swer to the third question. Peary's expedition, which began in 1898 and endured for four years and three months, was, as described by him, most remarkable in determining certain doubtful points in Arctic ex-ploration. He found out, for example: That the point of Graenard was ploration. He found out, for example: That the north point of Greenland was not the proper starting point for a dash across the polar pack to the pole; the character and probable origin of what is known as the paleocrystic ice, the constituent portion of the ice pack, the forms it assumes having long been a puzzle to explorers; the probable feasibility of Grinnell land as a startfeasibility of Grinnell land as a start-ing point for a polar dash; the feasi-bility of white or other explorers liv-ing and working indefinitely in Arctic regions, Peary assarting that he and his party did as good work and were in as good condition during the fourth in as good condition during the fourth year in the Arctics is at 'any time while they were away. The lecture was illustrated with a profusion of lantern slides. When a picture of Cape Jessup, the most north-

ern point of known land upon the earth, upon which rests in a cairn an American flag, was shown the applause was deafening. The course of Peary's expedition was

summarily a rush up the west coast of Greenland during the first year, from a base on the other side of the narrow strait between it and Grinnell land, to the north point of Greenland. From there he made a short dash for the pole, but was turned back by water lanes. He believes this point of land to be the most northern land on the globe and named it after Morris K. Jessup, chief of the group of men who financed the expedition. Other members of the Peary Arctic Club were remembered in the naming of bays, headlands and the like, the President figuring in the name of Roose-velt range, the most northern ridge of mountains. 
