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WORST STORM SINCE SAXBY ON COAST

Thousands of Dollars Damage to Nova Scotia Fishermen

Tides the Highest Known Since 1870—Westport Streets Inundated—Many Buoys Adrift and Lobster Traps Driven to Sea—Wharves and Buildings Carried Away as Well as Many Boats Hauled Up.

Digby, N. S., Jan. 8.—The worst gale of wind accompanied by the highest tide since the Saxby gale of Oct. 4, 1870, commenced here last night, and continued all day today, but has moderated this evening.

House Burned. While the gale was at its height at 1 o'clock this morning, the dwelling owned by James Ross, at Rosville, of Digby, was totally destroyed by fire, including its entire contents.

Many Buoys Adrift. The Digby fishing schooner Adriane was in the bay about twelve miles north of Point Prim when the owner, Rice A. Trawl, a fisherman, attempted to board her.

Great Damage at Westport. Ernest Peters' wharf and shop at Westport were destroyed totally, a portion of Howard Peters' wharf and fish building carried away.
