An example so commendable they would recommend to the attention of all who are interested in the success of Missions : many might be found throughout our extended work in this District, who would stoop to "the drudgery of begging," and thereby greatly enlarge the income of this Branch Society.

They would close their observations with the impressive Appeal made by the Committee of the Parent Society, respecting its *necessities* and *claims*.

It needs especially a larger number of such Missionaries as the Great Head of the church has been pleased to qualify for certain stations of peculiar difficulty, responsibility, and trust,—men of some considerable standing and experience, men of general knowledge and matured judgment, as well as of undoubted piety and zeal,—in whose hands might be properly and satisfactorily confided the superintendence of some important foreign districts, which
