

manner by others besides Indians,—by white men, priests, and white women, too, whose terrible revilings and curses it was grievous to hear, let alone to bear, even though their clubs, axes, and fire-brands were merely brandished over my head, or hurled into the air, in such a manner as to demonstrate how successfully those weapons would be used if they only dared.

I had to bear harder words still from a different quarter. "For it was not an enemy *now* that did it; *then* I could have borne it. But it was thou, my friend, mine equal. We had taken sweet counsel together, and had walked to the house of God in company." I had laid the matter before the Baptist denomination, but they were unable to undertake the mission, being burdened with their literary institutions, &c., and I was advised to appeal to the Christian public generally. This was done. But no sooner had the Christian public, ministers, and people of the different denominations, taken hold of the work of raising funds, in the most generous manner, requiring no concession on my part, except that in translating the New Testament the words referring to "Baptism" should be *transferred*, and not *translated*, than a storm was raised by the Baptist denomination; and article after article appeared in the *Messenger* and *Visitor*, denouncing me and the Baptist members of the Committee, in the most fearful manner, and treating our Peto-baptist friends, as well as myself, in such a style, that, on looking back upon it, I cannot but wonder that they did not desert us altogether in perfect disgust.
