He and others have been turned into radicals by the "inhumane, manipulative, disgusting way the capitalist society operates."

The notion that someone is try-ing to invade the U.S. is false, he said. "No one except the SDS is trying to invade America and they are doing it from within."


Mann went on to predict that a repeat performance of student revolt is assured in the U.S. next spring.


He was not sure how many universities would be involved in re-volt but he said "we'll be happy with two. We're not that powerful.'

Speaking on the possibility of a student revolt at U of A, he said, "It's up to you to decide if you want to follow suit."

Occupation of campus buildings lends strength to the student movement, Mann said. Occupa-tion may function "partly as a last resort and partly as an educational move.

"Who really runs the university is shown by the fact police drive students from buildings."
