The information which he is able to the Medical Examiner may include a individual characteristics such as livings or any unusual marks on the lond characteristics of the bone that cou identified and compared with X-ray or medical records. These characteristics, associated with any soft tissue remain may have been found at the site of the lor bone fragments, can help the M Examiner determine who the person and what led to his death.
