In honor of the event, Dr. Stanley A. Holling of Parkland Avenue has written a book entitled Our Heritage. Dr. Holling is a former director of the tuberculosis division of the ministry of health and has been a member of Christ Church United, the oldest congregation in Clarkson, since 1951. He is 80 years old, still an active member of the Mississauga Historical Society and recently researched his family history dating back to the 16th century. Our Heritage describes how the life of the church and community have been in-tertwined since pioneer times. has been a member of Christ

tertwined since pioneer times. Several pictures are included as well as maps depicting the purchase of land around the mouth of the Credit River from the Mississauga Indians in 1806.

According to Dr. Holling's research, the second land patent to be issued in the Clarkson area was granted to Sebastion Greeniaus in July, 1808. Descendents of the Greeniaus family are still
members of the present
church. An appendix of
ministers of the church is also
added to the book.
A reception in Dr. Holling's
honor was recently held in the
Merrigold Room of the church

Merigold Room of the church The room was named after a church member who donated a parcel of land at the corner of Clarkson and Lakeshore Roads for the second of four buildings in which the con gregation worshipped. Used as a church from 1875 to 1956

At the reception Dr. Holling spoke, giving some insight into the deprivation of early settlers in their struggle to survive. Health, sickness and death were dominant con-cerns in the minds of the pioneers as reflected from early letters, he said.

Dr. Holling described some of the home remedies used to treat injuries and aliments and discussed the work of itinerant Methodist preaches who visited the far-flung pioneer communities. One of the earliest records of church services indicates gatherings on the old Bradley farm south of the Lakeshore in 1826. His book includes names and Dr. Holling described some book includes names and anecdotes of early settlers and more recent residents of

Colarkson.


