I happened to be in Ottawa last Tuesday, and this matter was under discussion the same day. It was more or less accidental that I had a talk with Mr. Bennett. Certainly I have no special influence there, or I think any influence at all,—at least I never tried to exert any. I do feel though, and have good reson for what I say that the Government is well disposed toward the suggetion in the second last paragraph of your 1 tter, namely, to consider the claims of dealers in respect of cars they had on order at the time thechange took effect.

I think you should take your case up with either Mr. Rogers or Mr. Kennedy. Whichever one you prefer would be all right, though it is possible Mr. Kennedy might be in a better position to push the metter. If you would see him and arrange that other dealers act concertedly with you, I feel confident you would got results along the lines indicated above.
