Ontario Has Second Place.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries laid on the table of the House the other day the report on Canadian shipping for the year 1904.

It shows that the total number of vessels of all kinds old and new, sail, uteam and barges, remaining on the register books of the Dominion December 31 was 7.152, measuring 672.838 register or net tons, an increase of 132 yeasels, and a decrease of 19.309 tons, as compared with 1902. The number of steamers was 2.543, with a gross tonnage of 355.514. Assuming the average value to be \$39 per ton, the value of resistered tonnage of Canada would be \$20.185,140. The number of new vessels built and registered in the Dominion last year was 308, measuring 18.554 tons, which at \$45 per ton would give 3334,930, as the value of new vessels added during the year.

As a ship-owning Province, Nova Scotia leads with 2.056 sailing ships and steamers of 211,932 tons. Ontario comes next with 1.836 vessels of 175.000 tons. The others in order are: Quebec, 1.885 vessels, of 130,000 tons; British Columbia, 666 vessels, of 77.105 tons; New Brunswick, 932 vessels, of 54,855 tons; Prince Edward Island, 161 vessels, of 12.200 tons; Manitoba, 141 vessels, of 17.765 tons; new Brunswick, 932 vessels, of 78,855 tons; Prince Edward Island, 161 vessels, of 7.765 tons, and the Yukon with 12 vessels of 2.171 tons. The registered tonnage of the Dominion in 1878 was about double what it is to-day, namely, 1.333,000 tons, Great Britain and her Colonies own 11.225.421 tons. The steamer tonnage of the world is 17,183,661, of which 9.135,228 tons are owned in Great Britain and her Colonies. Statutory Commission With Full Powers To Be Created.

London, June 23.—Under pressure from all sides Premier Balfour has made a further concession in regard to the investigation into the army stores scandal, and yesterday announced in the House of Commons that the Government would immediately introduce a bill creating a statutory commission to inquire into the scandal. This commission will be armed with powers to compet the attendance of witnesses and to enferce penalties for perjury, etc., which the previously proposed Royal commission would not have possessed. Mr. Balfour also agreed to give June 25 for the debate on the vote of censure proposed by Sir Robert Theshie Reid (Liberal).
