UNION STOCK MARKETS TORONTO

Receipts of cattle were exceptionally heavy yesterday at the Union Stock Yards. In fact, when the day's arrivals of 4,438 were added some 100 left over from the previous week, the offerings were a little larger than the market could readily absorb, especially in consideration of the fact that only good to medium quality. Except for choice heavy cattle which held steady, prices generally were easier, yielding about 25¢ per cwt. below last Monday's quotations on good animals, while common grades were down 50 cents per cwt. Eleven cattle averaging 1,545 pounds sold at \$8.50; and several others sold at \$7.75 while good prices for the day were \$7.50 and \$7.65. The strength of the better classes of cattle was largely due to the demand from the abattoirs who appear to be doing an active trade shipping dressed carcasses to the United States. Present indications are that the supply in this country is light.

as high as this price. Choice veals were wanted, but a large proportion of the calves on the market were of inferior grade. Sheep were steady at \$3 to \$5.50, demand being fair for nice heavyweights. Fat sheep and culls sold at from \$1 to \$2 per cwt.

The hog market was strong with packers paying \$12.75 to \$13 per cwt. f.o.b. Supplies were light and demand very good.
