Addresses were given by H. H. Wickwire, M.P.P., Judge Barclay Webster, Lieut. (Dr.) Miller and the chairman Mayor Pelton and afterwards smokes were passed around to the boys in khaki followed by a lunch served by the ladies of the Red Cross.

It was a pleasing occasion and the citizens by becoming acquainted with our returned heroes will hereafter have more interest in their comfort and welfare.
