In a recent issue of this paper we published a letter over the signature of A. T. MONTREAL, 14th Feb., '87. THE EDITOR WEEK'S DOINGS, Londonbury, N. S. Sir,—I am this morning in receipt of your letter of 10th inst. I have not seen your issue of last week, but I annex a certain copy of what I wrote the Hon. Mr. McLellan on the 15th inst. which will enable you to judge whether you have published it correctly. I also send you a copy of Saturday's Montreal Gazette, in which you will find notice of application to Parliament for an act to incorporate the proposed new Londonbury Iron Co. I have no wish to induce any man to vote against his honest conviction, but as I think every one should have an opportunity of knowing the true facts, so as to form an intelligent decision, I have no hesitation in stating that in my opinion the maintenance of a Protective Tariff is essential to the development of the Iron and Mining interests of Nova Scotia, and if that policy be abandoned, I consider it will be impossible to carry on the Londonbury works successfully. The following quotations from the official reports of the House of Commons should be read with interest. The occasion was on the application of some candidates for a subsidy to the Stewiacke railway. Local Grit politicians are answered by the utterances of their own leaders.

Grit stamps in Colchester declared "W. McLELLAN has no influence at Ottawa." Mr. Blake states on the floor of Parliament: "He was not at all surprised that the application was granted, for the applicant was the Minister of Finance." The average Grit utterances the charge: "McLELLAN does nothing for Colchester." Mr. Vail answers them with another charge, "that Mr. (McLELLAN) appears to be looking after his own county, and neglects the Western Counties." They may settle their counter charges among themselves. Yet let us stand by the man who has manfully and ably advocated and protected the interests of our country.

(Hansard Report, May 28, 1886. Page 1882.) STATIONARY MACHINERY.—This railway is designed to meet the L. C. R. New Stewiacke station, and run easterly through the beautiful and fertile Stewiacke Valley for 25 miles, in order to give facilities for communication with the Iron Mines of this district, which is entirely without railway service.

Mr. VAIL: "Has there been any survey made of this railway, and if so, is it a profitable one?" Mr. BLAKE: "I can not say, but the man who has the project is, and I am not aware of any other person, who is applying for the subsidy, and the application was granted."

Mr. JAMES MACDONALD: "Then, of course it ought to be granted." Mr. BLAKE: "Because he has got the Treasury, and here is his levy." Mr. VAIL: "I am looking after his own county, and neglects the Western Counties."

The following from the Truro Guardian shows the estimate put upon the honest workmen of the place by the Liberal party:— "Our contemporary appears to be very angry because S. D. McLellan one time disqualified an applicant of a number of the best men of the Londonbury Iron Co. for 25 miles, in order to give facilities for communication with the Iron Mines of this district, which is entirely without railway service."

The writer of the above impeaches the character of some of our best citizens, when he says that disqualified persons applied to have their names placed on the electoral list. He continues, in that matter was perfectly honest."

We take the liberty to inform our contemporary that the men who made application, are not the kind that would do so, if they were disqualified. A good class of citizens are any other place, and quite as honorable. It was quite enough for S. D. McLellan to act as he did in this matter, but it is infinitely worse for the editor of a paper to attempt to defend it as "perfectly honorable." We fail to see wherein this is honor in depriving a good citizen of his franchise. This attempt to cast a reproach upon the character of some of our workmen by the Guardian, is about on a par with the remarks of Jones, relative to the railway men of Truro. Surely Gritism is at a low ebb when it tries to defend our industrial classes. Every workman in this town can be certain of one thing, and that is that if S. D. McLellan had his way, not one of them would have had a vote, and the Guardian would have defended his action as "perfectly honorable."

Gentlemen, you have a chance to resent such insults on the 22nd, and doubtless you will prove yourselves equal to the occasion. In the following the "Guardian" has so correctly described the manner in which the Liberal party here were treated, that we cannot refrain from producing it. Substitute magistrate for Dominion official, and Tory for Liberal, and it is a perfect affair.

"When the list of voters under the Dominion Act was being prepared, a Dominion official went around this town taking applications from parties wishing to have their names placed on the list. Among the number who handed him applications were several Liberals. The applications of those Liberals were duly filed up and sent to before the road Dominion official, but were never handed to the Revising Barrier."

Coming, as this did, from the "Guardian," one would naturally suppose the editor had been let into the secret, and, as a consequence, he had tried to fit the circumstance on another individual.

The Truro Guardian complains about our remarks on the short line, and refers to what we said about Judge James not giving a verdict on Short Line matters that came before him. This bodilized paper accuses us of ignorance in the matter, and asserts that "Judge James has for some given judgment in the case referred to." Our remarks were substantially correct. If judgment had been given there would not be need for an Order in Council assenting to the same, and the first intimation of the judgment being given was on the morning when the esteemed Guardian was issued, the 15th Feb., 1887. We
