Mr. J. H. Morse organist at the First Baptist church, Montreal has been at Berwick attending Camp meeting and spent Sunday with friends at Canard.

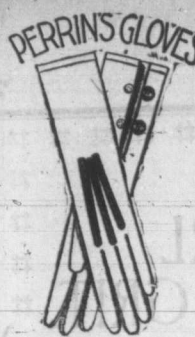
