ome flot Figh ing Likely-Enemy Tried to Rush a convoy Near Boshof.

Bloemfontein, Friday, April 21, -Continuing their march on Friday Gens. Chermside and Rundle came into contact with Boers near Dewets dorp at noon. The fighting continued until dark and was principally carried on by the artillery, which temporarily silenced two of the Boer guns.

The British command the hills for miles around the Boers, who are reported to hold strong positions, but are probably retiring.

The casualties on the British side

President Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R., has entered the big American railway pact and agreed to abolish all commissions on the sale of tickets. The escort took up a position on a hill commanding the road just on a nill commanding the road just in the nick of time, as a force of 2,000 Boers with two guns and a pompom suddenly appeared in the vicinity and opened a very heavy fire.
