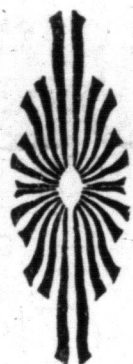

## WAS VERY BRUTAL

St. Thomas Woman Threw Boiling Water on a Young Man

Because She Thought he was Treasoning—He May die—The Woman Arrested.

St. Thomas, August 27.—A most singular and deplorable affair, which may result fatally, occurred here about five o'clock Saturday afternoon. It appears that Glen Tyler, driver of Butler Bros. delivery wagon, entered an outhouse in the rear of the Centre street terrace, at the Ross street crossing, which is on the premises of a family named Hulbert. The mistress of the place, probably annoyed by what seemed to her a case of trespass, picked up a pail of boiling water, walked through the yard, opened the door and emptied the contents upon the unfortunate young man. His agonizing cries brought the neighbors to the scene, who did everything possible to relieve the sufferer. He was frightfully burned around the abdomen and down the legs, the flesh falling in pieces from the body. After the doctors had cut away his clothes, he was conveyed to his father's residence, No. 31 Forest avenue, where he now lies in a precarious condition. Mrs. Hulbert was immediately arrested and lodged in jail. She has five children and a husband. The latter is a farm laborer, at present employed by M. Penhale, Yarmouth. Young Tyler is a son of Emery Tyler, Michigan Central engineer.

## TO ATTACK BOTHA

Lord Roberts has Left Pretoria for Machedodorp.

Now Within a Few Miles of the Main Boer Army—Dewet has Few Followers.

London, Aug. 27.—Lord Roberts has left Pretoria for the first time in several weeks, and sends a despatch from Wonderfontein, 112 miles east of the capital, describing the progress made by French and Poole-Carew in pressing back Botha's army. The good impression produced by this information yesterday was somewhat dampened by a larger message from the commander-in-chief, stating that another little mishap had occurred to a part of General Buller's force engaged with another of Botha's commandos. On Thursday, by some mistake two companies of a British infantry regiment advanced far beyond the firing line after an engagement was supposed to have occurred, and were surrounded by the Boers, losing nearly 100 men killed, wounded and prisoners. The affair was unimportant, except as showing the continued activity and alertness of the Boers in this quarter.

A despatch from Cape Town says: Lord Roberts arrived yesterday at Belfast, a few miles west of Machedodorp, where he met Sir Redvers Buller, Gen. French and Gen. Poole-Carew. Everything is now in readiness for the advance. De Wet's progress eastward seems now effectually checked by Baden-Powell, who has got across the line separating him from the Lydenburg and Barberton districts. The great guerilla leader has fallen back, and is now understood to be making for the Orange Free State again, probably intending to attack Roberts' communications. According to the commander-in-chief, De Wet has only 300 men with him, but this may be an underestimate.

## MORE RACE RIOTS.

A Shooting in New York Leads to More Turbulence.

New York, Aug. 27.—A number of in-cipient race riots between blacks and whites broke out here yesterday, the direct cause being the shooting on Saturday night of John Brennan, a messenger boy, aged 20, by John Davis, alias "Lamp Lighter," a negro. Brennan was one of a crowd of whites who taunted Davis, and bullets from the black's revolver lodged in his stomach and chest. He is in a hospital and likely to die. The shooting was done at 62nd street, and, becoming noised about, the rough white element began to search out negroes. Several were almost beaten to death without cause. Some arrests were made.

## ONE MORE ROUND.

Thirty Thousand Boxers Said to be Anxious Therefor.

Are Advancing on Pekin—Danger of a Famine at Tien Tsin.

London, Monday, Aug. 27, 4 a. m.—The latest news from Pekin indicates that the situation there is unchanged. The imperial city is still invested, but has not yet been occupied. The allies when the last report left were still refraining from aggressive action pending instruction from their governments. At a conference of ministers and generals held at Taku Friday it was decided, according to the Daily Telegraph, to refer the fate of the forbidden city to Europe. An attack from 30,000 Boxers was anticipated, and to meet this the whole American force and the British artillery, according to a despatch to the Morning Post from Pekin, dated Aug. 18, were moved to the outer city wall. The Boxers were reported coming from the south.

Gen. Dowd, in his report of the engagement outside Tien Tsin, Aug. 19, when the British, Americans and Japanese signally defeated a large force of Boxers, killing over 300, says, in a despatch, dated Aug. 25:—The lines of communication near Tien Tsin are now free from danger. The enemy had been treating the villagers badly. Several decapitated bodies were found near their camp. The villagers are now flocking to Tien Tsin at the rate of about 1,000 a day. As there is not more than a month's food supply, there is every prospect of a famine in consequence of the inadequacy of provisions for the hordes of refugees at Tien Tsin, add a new element of peril to the situation. Shanghai advisers say that the report of the capture of Emperor Kwang-Su, by the Japanese, was erroneous. It was a case of mistaken identity.

## BOLTS FROM BRYAN.

The Slump of the Democrats Seems to Have Commenced.

Chicago, Aug. 27.—The Hon. Charles Denby, of Indiana, ex-United States minister to China, and member of the first commission to the Philippines—a life-long Democrat—has written a letter urging the re-election of President McKinley. It is entitled "Bryan's Route towards the Philippines," and is made public by the Republican national committee.

## CORDUA DIED GAME.

Walked Fearlessly to the Scene of His Execution and Declared He Was Ready.

London, Aug. 27.—A special from Pretoria gives details of the execution on Friday of Lieut. Cordua, of the Transvaal Artillery, convicted by court-martial of breaking his parole in plotting to abduct Lord Roberts and kill British officers. Cordua walked fearlessly to the garden behind the jail. At his own request he was not bound, and sat in a chair with folded arms. He told Capt. Barchard, commanding the firing party, that he was ready, and ten bullets struck him. The body was buried near the spot where the lieutenant fell.

## JEFFRIES WILL FIGHT

Bob Fitzsimmons Once More—The Date Not Yet Settled.

New York, Aug. 27.—Bob Fitzsimmons has challenged Champion Jim Jeffries for a fight to take place August 31, and has posted \$2,500 as a forfeit. Fitz says that Jeffries must meet him on that date or admit he is afraid of him. Jeffries, who was at Derby, Conn., during the day, was seen there, and said, relative to the challenge: "I have defeated Fitzsimmons decisively once and think I can do it again, but I am not going to fight him until I have a rest, for the fight-going public need a rest. Still I shall allow no engagements to interfere with my championship battle, but I reserve the right to set aside time to train." W. A. Brady, manager of Champion Jeffries, said in regard to Fitzsimmons' challenge to Jeffries: "I have covered Fitzsimmons' deposit of \$2,500 to make a match with Jeffries for the championship, and will meet Fitzsimmons to-day to decide on the time and place of meeting."

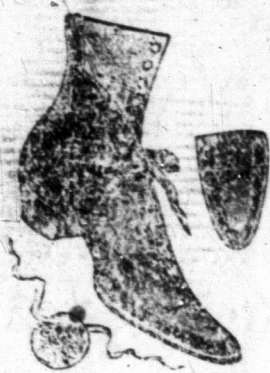
