THE BANNER'S SMALLNESS

The Chatham Banner-News, the little, plucky, local organ of the Liberal party, could not see any enthusiasm in the big reception tendered R. L. Borden on his arrival here Saturday—or, at least, said it could not—the Toronto Globe, the leading Liberal journal in the Dominion, did not hesitate to give credit where credit was due. All of the out-of-town newspapers that had special representatives here spoke of the meeting as a most enthusiastic one. Even the Liberal journals, with the lone exception of our unscrupulous contemporary, in speaking of the meeting were big enough to tell the truth about the matter.

The Banner said there wasn't a cheer—not a ghost of a cheer. They even tried to insinuate that the crowd was small and not enthusiastic. Here is a portion of what the Globe said, which should make the Banner feel ashamed of its smallness:

MODERN LIGHT PLANT

omy of steam. This engine can be duplicated under pressure. The crank case is enclosed, and the oil is forced through all the bearings under twenty pounds pressure, so that all the bearings run in a film of oil and there is practically no wear on them. This is one of the highest types of engines built for power and lighting purposes.

This engine's mighty side-partner is a generator, which is directly connected with it. It was built by the Canadian General Electric Co., of Peterboro', Ont., and is of the same capacity as the engine. It produces currents for incandescent and arc lighting, store or street lighting, also for motors for power services. It is the most modern type of electric generator made.

This department also contains two other new dynamos of the same type in a smaller size, making three dynamos altogether. The two small dynamos are run by gas engines, being extended and an extra section is being put in.

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The entire installation and setting up of this big plant—boilers, dynamos, electrical apparatus, etc.—was done by the Gas Company's expert workmen, and though this feat is a very unusual one for the employees of a plant of such size as the local one, it was completed to the entire satisfaction of all concerned, which speaks very highly for the men in charge of the various departments of the power house.

The boilers and steam engines were set up under the supervision of Ed. Grandbois, chief engineer, and his assistant, Wm. Montgomery. The switch-boards, with connections to the generators, were built under the supervision of Frank Hayes, chief electrician. These gentlemen and their assistants are to be congratulated upon the finished appearance of their work.

Manager Cowie himself got out the design for the plant, marking out the location for each machine. The arrangement has turned out to be a big success from a standpoint of both efficiency and economy, as well as for appearance. The plant as it stands can be operated at a lesser cost than any plant of its kind in the country.

The new plant was put in for the purpose of taking care of the increasing demand for electric lighting. This increase was extended by the lower rates of the Gas Company for electric current. The Gas Company are now prepared to furnish lighting and also power for motors, twenty-four hours, all three services. They will be in a position to furnish the citizens of Chatham with current for these different purposes as efficient and at as low a price as any place in the country.

The Chatham Gas Company first started business in 1872, and in 1887 commenced supplying electrical current with one dynamo and forty lights. From this it has been enlarged till at the present day it has a capacity of 30,000 lights.
