POLITICIANS AND MORALITY.

It is alleged now that Hon. C. S. Hyman, will not be the candidate in London when the bye-election is brought on. With Emerson banded because he was charged with immorality, it would seem impossible for Sir Wilfrid Laurier to take back Mr. Hyman, except for one thing—Sir Wilfrid can do almost anything inconsistent and get off with it. Hyman is still Minister of Public Works and there is another Minister still in the Cabinet who was represented as being "in the stocks." Moreover, it is freely believed that Sir Wilfrid would gladly bring Clifford Sifton back into his Cabinet, if Sifton would come back unconditionally.

What does the country think of a government with so many members of it afraid to meet charges of being connected with "wine, women and graft?" Does the public conscience shrink from the reproach? We think not. The chances are that Clifford Sifton could still be elected in Brandon; that Emerson could still be elected in Westmoreland; that Hyman (with the usual assistance) could still be elected in London.

Party feeling runs so high that the immorality we would unsparingly condemn in an opponent we freely excuse in our party candidate. His immoralities may even gain him votes. Even clergymen and other Christian workers will join hands in electing a candidate whom they know to be immoral rather than vote against the ticket, or refrain from voting. This has happened so frequently that there is good reason to doubt whether we are sincere in our desire to have a parliament above reproach morally. In the abstract we hit immorality hard blows, but in the concrete form of our party candidate we don't hit—we hug. It is the other fellow we hit, though he be clean and pure.—Kincaid Review.

POLICE AND C. P. R.

Lively Time Over the Closing of a Railway Crossing.

Calgary, Alta., June 4.—A general mix-up between the Northwest Mounted Police, the authorities of the Town of Olds, and the C.P.R. officials, was yesterday the result of the railway officials trying to close up a crossing in the town, backed up by a posse of police.

The first conflict took place between the town officials and the police, who were guarding the men at work on the railway crossing. The C.P.R. had threatened to block up the crossing before, but had always met with severe opposition on the part of the citizens and the authorities at Olds.

This time, however, the company had determined to carry their decision to a successful issue, and obtained the assistance of a squad of Mounted Police to guard their workmen.

The precaution was not unwisely taken, for the men had done but little work when the trouble started. Both sides were determined to carry their point, the town to have the crossing left open, and the C.P.R. to close it, and the police had been detailed to protect the C.P.R. workmen, and were placed in the awkward position of taking the defence of a corporation against the authorities of a town.

There was a conflict, and the first shot was fired. Arrows were made on both sides on warrants signed by the mayor of the town, and among those placed under arrest were several C.P.R. officials, and warrants were issued for Police Inspector Duffin and C.P.R. Superintendent Kibbick. The Mounted Police patrolled the streets last night.

MUSICAL

HOLY TRINITY RECITAL.

To those who attended the sacred recital given by the Holy Trinity church choir last Monday evening, it is unnecessary to say that it was one of the choicest events of the season. To those who were not present, the assurance that the program was under the management of Mrs. John Cooper, Chatham's own talented soprano soloist and director, is sufficient to guarantee its artistic merit and excellent presentation. It only served to add another to the long list of enviable triumphs which this attractive and popular musician has scored among the musical people of the Maple City.

A short time ago it was announced that Mrs. Cooper would sever her associations with the Holy Trinity choir, and simultaneously it was learned that Miss Rose Morrison, the capable young organist, was also about to resign her position. Universal regret was expressed by the members of the church, for both these ladies are very deservedly popular in this congregation. The recital was given as a farewell event, and it final impressions are lasting, both Mrs. Cooper and Miss Morrison will long be remembered as worthy exponents of the European art.

Long before the hour of opening the church was crowded to the doors. The program, as it has been previously published, was carried out in its entirety. Two excellent anthems, one unaccompanied, were rendered in a masterly style by the choir. Under the leadership of Mrs. Cooper, assisted as she has been very materially by Miss Morrison, this choir has made exceptional progress and has been brought up to a very high state of efficiency. Their singing Monday evening was full, spirited, and well balanced, and gave evidence of real artistic training.

Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Oldershaw gave a very pretty duet, "The Lord Is My Shepherd." Both of these ladies were in excellent voice and sang with great ease and marked expression.

Mrs. Milton Bogart, the "sweet singer" from the Park street Methodist church, sang "The Day Is Ended" in a most finished style. Mrs. Bogart deserves all of her popularity and seems to please more, the oftener she appears in concert.

Mr. Everard Gordon, who, since he came to Chatham has established a universal reputation as a violinist of extraordinary ability, was never common to criticism that Mr. Gordon has complete control over his instrument, and there is a soul of meaning in his playing, which is rare, even among musicians of far more extended experience. He played an (a) and (b) number, "Thy Will Be Done," and "Simple Aven." Mr. J. D. McAlpine, one of the latest additions to Chatham's list of accomplished singers, gave an excellent and pleasing interpretation of "The Unseen Kingdom."

The ladies quartette, composed of Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Bogart, Miss Schwenler and Miss McGee, sang a new arrangement of "One Sweetly Sings the Soul of Thee." One of the aptest ways of describing this selection as it was rendered is to say it was all that the name would imply—sweet and solemn.

"The Vesper Hour," a very pretty duet, received ample attention from Miss Schwenler and Mr. Ratley. "El Preco O Padre," a difficult trio arrangement by Nicolai, was given by Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Bogart and R. W. Angus.

The evening was closed by an appropriate selection, "God Be With You," by Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Bogart, Miss Schwenler, Mr. Angus and Mr. J. W. Wilson.

Miss Rose Morrison played the accompaniments throughout, and although her task was a difficult and exacting one, she was quite equal to the occasion. Special mention should be made of her "Offertoire" given at the opening of the program.

During the evening Rev. J. W. Hodgins paid a neat and appropriate tribute to both Mrs. Cooper and Miss Morrison, expressing the regret felt by every member of the congregation at their removal from their posts of duty in the church.
