## 5000 New Settlers for Nova Scotia.

We have received a copy of the report of the Secretary of Industries, Mr. Arthur S. Barnsted, containing an account of the work done by his department during the year ended September, 30th, 1913.

5166 persons entered Nova Scotia during the year, 4250 from English speaking countries and 2566 from other countries. Of the English speaking persons 1487 were males, 1033 females, 148 wives and 292 children joined their husbands and fathers. 373 families were settled as such in Nova Scotia.

146 farmers settled in the province with capital totalling \$302,500. The total capital possessed by all who came in amounted to \$376,300. In addition to the 146 farmers, 61 housewives and 102 children were placed on farms.

Fifty four newcomers purchased or rented farms in the Province. A promising feature of the settlement of the lands is the noticeable return of Nova Scotians to their native province. Numerous enquiries in respect to Nova Scotia are being received by the Department from settlers in Western Canada.

A table shows giving particulars of the loans applied for and granted during the year under the Act for the Encouragement of the Settlement of Farm Lands. The amount of loans applied for totalled \$82,333, of which \$30,745 were granted. The amount of interest for loans, 22 were natives of the province and 23 were newcomers.

The travelling representative of the Department in Great Britain, Mr. E. Elderkin, accompanied the American Commission which visited Europe last summer to study the sub-ject of rural credit and co-operation. Mr. Elderkin presents an interesting report dealing with various phases of the subject and an additional number of copies of this special report on co-operation is being printed to be distributed among the farmers of the province.

## A. L. Davidson is Making Good.

Ottawa, Mar. 29.—The independent Ottawa Journal says editorially:—  
"These long debates have their value in unearthing talent. For instance, one of the surprises of the session was A. L. Davidson's speech yesterday. It was a splendid effort. Mr. Davidson is one of the young men of the house. He is thirty six. In 1905 and 1909 he was conservative of opinion in Nova Scotia. In 1911 he was beaten in the provincial election in Annapolis by only 9 votes. He captured the Federal seat of Annapolis in 1912 with a majority of 15. The previous liberal majority was 221.

In the introduction to its new report of the speech, the Journal further says: "One of the finest speeches of the National Transcontinental debate in the commons so far as that delivered by A. L. Davidson, the young member for Annapolis. At the conclusion he was greeted with loud applause from the members of the conservative party sitting around, who shook him by the hand, at the same time extending hearty congratulations upon a really notable contribution."
