## STREET CAR MEN ALVIN PICARY SEN AGREMENT

Vancouver, Sept., 2.-At a conference between the management of the B. C. Electric Company and committees from the various unions concerned in the agreement covering wages and working conditions reheld this morning, the final details of the new agreement were settled and the document signed by both

The agreement is to run for two years and covers the employees engaged in the operation of the company's railway department on both the mainland and the Island.

In announcing that the agreement had been signed, General Manager R. H. Sperling stated that the terms of the agreement! were such as made it difficult for the company to fully assent to all the provisions. In the convenience of the public and for reasons of a similar nature, the com pany had accepted the agreement. Now that the company was bound by the new terms it would probably be necessary for its officials to find ways and means for increasing the revenues from its railway department in order that the additional financial obligations entailed by the Poday closes a busy week at the new agreement might be met.
