PALERNO, Dec. 31-The roads be ween Palermo and Messina are filled with long and sad processions of the wounded refugees, and the sights to be seen as they painfully make their way to the westward are simply heart rending. They all say they think they

The walls of several of the principle bulldings of Messina are still standing, but they are so weakened that they will have to be demolished as soon as possible to prevent fatalities among the rescuers. Every day the undermined masenry comes crashing down.
