

CANADA LIFE PROMOTIONS.

OLD HAMILTON BOYS ARE COMING TO THE TOP.

Messrs. Frank Sanderson, Alex. Gillespie, J. K. McMaster and Others Appointed to Important Positions.

The marked growth of the Canada Life's business in recent years and the death of Mr. R. Hills, who so long and ably filled the office of secretary, have made necessary a reorganization of the official staff of the company, and the people of Hamilton will be glad to note that in almost every instance where a promotion has taken place the office has been filled by a member of the old Hamilton staff of the Canada Life. So much has been said as to progress of Canadians in the United States that it is refreshing occasionally to hear of the success of Canadians in their own country.

Announcement was recently made of the appointment to be joint manager of Mr. Frank Sanderson, the company's actuary, after seventeen years' service, a number of which were spent at the head office of the company when located in Hamilton. A further announcement is now made of important promotions to a number of other old Hamiltonians.

Mr. A. Gillespie, assistant secretary, who was well known for many years throughout Canada as a leading cricketer and a member of a number of international teams, has been promoted, after thirty years' service, to the important office of secretary of the company.

Mr. J. K. McMaster, who has been with the company over twenty-five years, and who, after filling the post of chief clerk in the actuary's department for a number of years, has become manager of the company's literature and advertising department since 1900, now becomes chief inspector of agencies and editor of the company's literature.

Mr. G. Donohoe Burns, who for eight years has been chief accountant at the company's head office, becomes manager of the important central Ontario branch, with headquarters at Hamilton. Mr. Burns, who is very well known to Hamiltonians, joined the company as a junior about 1880, and has steadily risen in the service until now he receives this important appointment. Doubtless he will fill it with credit to himself and satisfaction to his company. It is understood that Mr. Burns will take up his new duties about the first of May, and he will have the co-operation of Mr. George E. Gates, secretary of the branch, whose personal knowledge and experience of the company have done much to further its interests in Hamilton in recent years.

Mr. David Kidd, who is retiring from the exacting duties of branch manager after forty-two years' connection with the company, has built up a large business in and about Hamilton and this will doubtless be largely engendered under the new arrangement.

Mr. C. R. Ares, who has been with the company for twenty years, has for several years been cashing of the company's head office. He has made a special study of the course of the chartered accounts of Ontario, and has thus equipped himself for the important post of chief accountant, to which he has been appointed.

Mr. C. W. Hicketts, also a well known old Hamiltonian, assumes the duties of cashier at head office, a post for which his long experience and integrity should admirably qualify him.

It will be seen from the foregoing that the offices of joint general manager, secretary, chief inspector of agencies, chief accountant and cashier, besides an important branch manager, are all being filled by members of the old Hamilton staff.

A number of other old Hamiltonians have also been to positions of trust and responsibility in the company's service, amongst them being Mr. W. E. Brown, son of Mr. Adam Brown, head of the policy department; and Mr. A. E. Ferrie, chief clerk of the treasurer's department. In addition to these there are on the company's head office staff a number of younger Hamilton boys, who, doubtless, as opportunity offers, will have fitted themselves for promotion.

It is indeed gratifying that in an institution which so long was identified with our good city, the old members of the staff who were taken with it when it removed to a larger sphere have been given ample opportunity by the management to prove their worth; and, as the foregoing list of promotions indicates, have demonstrated that to the directors.

TISDALE TO RETIRE.

Extension of Time Granted For C. T. R. Extensions.

(Special Dispatch to the Times.)

Ottawa, Ont., April 14.—The Railway Committee of the House of Commons passed the Grand Trunk Pacific branch lines to-day. This was for an extension of time. Two years was granted to begin and five years to complete. These branch lines are for the main line to Ottawa, Oshawa, Hudson Bay, Regina, Calgary, Prince Albert, Battleford, Vancouver, Victoria, Dawson, St. John and other points.

W. H. Biggar, counsel for the company, said that a number of the western branches would be left summer. Col. Tisdale, who has been for many years an active member of the committee, and who was a member of the Powell Cabinet, announced that he was in all probability attending the committee for the last session, meaning that he would not again be a candidate for Parliament, and that he intended retiring from political life. He supported the bill. He spoke of the great future in store for Canada.

NOTHING IN IT.

Tunisian Passengers Were Not Neglected Nor Abused.

(Special Dispatch to the Times.)

Ottawa, Ont., April 14.—W. D. Scott, Superintendent of Immigration being interviewed in regard to the alleged delay and ill-treatment of immigrants who arrived by the Tunisian at Halifax, gives the story denial. A. W. Annand, the agent of the department at Halifax, says that the Tunisian arrived at 12.25 p. m. the second class passengers commenced to land at 2.30 and were all off at 2.15 p. m. The examination commenced at 3 and was concluded at 4.25. Third class passengers landed at 4 p. m. The examination commenced at 5 and finished at 10.45, and Dr. Hawkins, the medical health officer, was through his work at 7.30. The number of passengers on board was 1,000. The report states that there was no ill-treatment of passengers. The presumption is that the passengers had their lunch before they arrived at quarantine. There may have been a slight delay, Mr. Annand says, while the officials were waiting for nothing more, concluding his telegram. Mr. Annand says, "Naturally passengers object to being corralled, even for a short time."

M. P.'S. RETIRING.

Premier Will Probably Be Oldest Member in House Next Session.

Toronto, April 14.—Many members attended their last session of the Legislature Saturday. The three "baby members" will not come back again. Messrs. Edward A. Dunlop (North Renfrew), aged 31; John A. McMillan (Glenagarry), aged 32, and Arch. B. McGoig (West Kent), aged 33, the three youngest representatives of the House will not seek re-election to the Legislature. Mr. Dunlop is retiring, and Messrs. McMillan and McGoig are both probable candidates for the House of Commons in their respective ridings.

The two veteran members of the Legislature are also retiring. Mr. John Smith (Peel), aged 72 years, the oldest representative in the House, will not seek re-election, while Hon. Dr. Willoughby (East Northumberland), who is nearing the three score and ten, is not expected to again contest his constituency.

This will leave the Prime Minister, Hon. Mr. Whitney, the oldest member in the House. Despite the fact that Mr. Whitney has not yet a white hair in his head, he is the senior of all the members, all of whom are adorned by snowy whiskers.

The Prime Minister is 63 years of age, only one year separating him from the former head of the province, Hon. Geo. W. Ross.
